#### THE WAR SITUATION

Uneasiness over the Russian situation in German and Austrian official circles is indicated in reports in the German press. The central powers are said to be uncertain concerning the future attitude of Foreign Minister Trotzky and the Bolshevik Government and one Berlin newspaper says that the announce-ment that the Russlan army has been ordered demobilized was "some new manoeuvre."

Central Powers Worried. One report is to the effect that the military operations against the Bolsheviki might be resumed, but both Berlin and Vienna appear to be anxious over the probable fate of the many thousands of Austro-German prisoners in Russian
