Sir William Praises London For Progressive Spirit Shown.

CITY OF HOMES NEEDED

London Should Aim at This Rather Than at Tenements.

Sir William Hearst declared the new ternoon. Chairman Pocock of the utilities commission, in asking Sir William to open the building, said that the commission started business seven years ago. Today it has 12,500 customers. The city had issued \$766,000 in debentures, and in three funds it has since gathered together \$460,000. Besides it has made other investments out of profits, and today has a total investment of over one million dollars.

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Mr. Pocock declared that the building was unique in as much as it was built by the utilities staff and by day labor. When complete, he said, the cost would be about \$115,000.

London, July 10.-The situation Siberia is undergoing important changes | Advertiser Illustrati and the counter-revolution, assisted by the Czecho-Slovaks is spreading all over the handsomest public buildings in the province. Western Siberia, says a dispatch to the Times from Pekin dated July 4. The Bolsheviki are being driven westward from Irkutsk and many are endeavoring to escape into Mongolia.

Referring to the Czecho-Slovak move-ment as a basis for the struggle against Bolshevism in Siberia, the correspond-ent predicts that it will lead to the elimination of the Bolsheviki in a short time.

The question of intervention, however, is still pressing, he adds, because Russia is torn with political differences and personal fealousies and there is urgent need of a responsible govern-

ment.

Political circles in Harbin are discussing the danger of a new government in the eastern provinces, which may be formed of elements favoring the old regime. Pro-Ally forces at Harbin have declared for an immediate summoning of the constituent assembly, which real need of the situation.

London, July 10.—A new provisional government for Siberia, which has the unanimous support of the population, and which will continue to fight the central powers, has been established at Vladivostok. According to a Times dispatch from Tokio, quoting the Vladivostok correspondent of the Asahi, the new government intends to institute a new constituent assembly and restore order throughout the country. London, July 10.—Sir William A. M. Goode, liasion officer of the food ministry, in an address today before the consumers' council, gave striking figures, showing how the people of the United States, by self-imposed food restrictions, have aided greatly in maintaining the food supply of the European allies.

llies. From July, 1917, to April, 1918, the Fried States exported to the Allies 0.000,000 bushels of wheat products, aid Sir Willam. It was calculated by Herbert Hoover, United States food administrator, that 50,000,000 of this represented the voluntary sacrifice of the American people. American exports of pork products to the Allies in March, 1918, were 308,000,000 pounds. This was accomplished by "porkless" days and ceaseless hog production in the United States.

Rome, July 10.—Austria has declined accept the German General Otto von to accept the German General Otto von Below as commander-in-chief of the forces on the Italian front, because Germany refused to send twelve German divisions with him, according to the newspaper Epocha, which bases the statement on advices from a Swiss source. Austria, it adds, has temporarily given up the idea of revenging herself for her recent defeat by Italy. Dispatches from Rome through Paris on July 7 reported that Germany intended sending three army corps to the aid of Austria to be put under Gen. Otto von Below as commander-in-chief on the Italian front. Reports from Zurich several days earlier declare that Gen. von Below had been appointed commander-in-chief, but there has been no official confirmation that such a change in command had been effected or was contemplated.
