TO AUSTRIA ON **POLISH QUESTION**

Stand and Wins Out.

London, Aug. 17.—Germany has made concessions to Austria on the Polish stand taken by Emperor Charles and the Austro-Hungarian Government, according to information received by the correspondent of the Daily Mail at The Hague, to which the Mail gives much

It is possible there will be no personal union of the crowns of Poland and Austria, but the king of Poland is certain to be an Austrian archduke, says the correspondent, who adds that the discussion at German main headquarters had the following basis:

The Germans demanded that Austria sead to the western front from ten to fifteen divisions of picked troops, confining themselves to the defensive on the Italian front.

Emperor Charles' Demand.

New York, Aug. 17.—The Associated Press this morning issued the following:
Roye, the central bastion of the German defence line from Peronne to Noyon, which has withstood allied thrusts for nearly a week, is menaced by advancing French, British and Canadian troops, and its fall would appear to be a probability of the next few hours.

With the town in allied hands, the southern end of the German line at least undoubtedly would have to retire, although the northern end, through Chaulines to Peronne, would be affected. The Allies are now but a scant one and one-guarter miles west of the town, while they are pressing eastward in the north and in the south.

Along a front of nearly nine miles north and south of the Avre, which flows through Roye, the Allies have pushed back the enemy in stubborn fighting. The most notable advance was made on a front of three miles in the centre by French and Canadian troops, who now are fighting ing in a line through Goyencourt, St. Mard-les-Tricot and Laucourt. St. Mard-les-Tricot and Laucourt. Allied Successes.

French troops on the south have forced their way almost through the Loges Wood, which borders the Roye-Lassigny road on the west. The wood is five miles directly south of Roye, and it would appear that a further advance might enable the French to outflank both Roye and Lassigny and force the Germans to readjust their lines eastward toward Noyon and probably beyond. North of Goyencourt, British forces, after having repulsed an enemy attack on Dumery, in which 250 prisoners were captured, are pushing eastward with French units toward Fransart and Fresnoy-les-Roye.

Artillery activity continues on the remaining sectors of the main battlefront between the Ancre and the remaining sectors of the main bat-tlefront between the Ancre and the Olse. The British on the northern end and the French on the southern maintain their newly-gained tions and the enemy has shown no

tions and the enemy has shown no disposition to attack. German Gas Again.

Berlin reports officially that alfled attacks on both sides of the Avre on Friday falled. The German war office has nothing further to say of the withdrawals in the Lys salient and along the Ancre. Admission of the loss of Attiche Farm, southwest of Noyon, to the French is made, but it is said that six French attacks against Lassigny on Thursattacks against Lassigny on Thursday were repulsed.

American and French troops along the Vesle have undergone an attac

American and French troops along the Vesle have undergone an attack in which the Germans used gas, artillery and bombing aviators. This attack followed an incursion by American aviators, who heavily bombed German bridges over the Alsne and discovered enemy artillery and machine gun nests. The German airplanes were brought down by American airmen Thursday. British and French airmen on the same day put 32 enemy machines out of action, while Berlin reports the destruction of 24 allied airplanes.

Italians Repulse Attacks.

Italian troops in the Tonalee region, northwest of Lake Garda, and along the south Plave have withstood Austrian attacks against their new positions on these sectors. Otherwise the situation is unchanged in Northern Italy. Spain, which recently sent another note to Germany protesting against the destruction of Spanish merchantmen by submarines, is reported to have notified Berlin that hereafter the Spanish Government will make up notified Berlin that hereafter the Spanish Government will make up losses sustained through U-boats by seizing German shipping in Spanish harbors. 


