With the British Army in France, Sept. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—
The British have broken the Drocourt-Queant line on a broad front. In a fierce battle, which has been raging since the war began and increased in intensity, since the British blew their way forward, meeting the growing resistance of the enemy, who has put in very available man and is rushing up reserves at the rear. the powerfully-organized defensive system known as the Drocourt-Quears, line, which is on the other side of the River Scarpe. On the whole front of the assault the resistance was broken with assault the resistance was broken with great losses to the enemy. The Canadians have taken Dury, Villers-lez-Cagnicourt, and Cagnicourt, and have made progress beyond these places.

"On their left English battalions fought their way forward throughout the German defences north of Eter-

the German defences north of Eterpligny.

"On the right of the attack Scottish troops pressed forward beyond Reincourt-lez-Cagnicourt in the direction of Queant and captured many strongly sortified positions, including the village of Noreull. South of this point our troops made progress, and early in the afternoon repulsed a counter-attack which the enemy launched in great strength east of Vaulx-Vraucourt.

"The English reached the outskirts of Beugny and have taken Villers-auflos. There was sharp fighting throughout the day about Le Transloy. In this locality hostile counter-attacks were repulsed and the English captured the village.

CRIME A POLITICAL ONE?

Tang Hui Lung, the Victim, Had Been on Special Mission to U. S.

VICTORIA, Sept. 2.-Tang Hui Lung, minister of education for China, brother of Admiral Ting Fui Ah Ming of the war department, Peking. was assassinated at 8 o'clock last night by Mah Chew, a local Chinese barber. The motive for the murder is thought to have been political. to have been political.

Tang Hui Lung was leaving the Chinese Club, where he had been dining, when Mah Chew, waiting outside with a revolver in each hand, fired two shots at the minister. One penetrated the jaw and the other the breast. The victural day within affect minutes. tim died within fifteen minutes.

The murdered took to his heels, and after running several blocks turned one of the weapons upon himself, dying in the street as his pursuers came upon him. The minister, who had been here since August 26, had been in Washington on a secret mission for the Chinese Government, it was said.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—By procla-mation issued today President Wilson set \$2.20 a bushel as the minimum price guaranteed by the Government for the guaranteed by the Government for the 1919 wheat crop.
A disinterested commission, the president stated, will be appointed to see whether the increased cost of farm labor and supplies would justify an increase above that price.
