U. S. WILL HAVE ARMY OF ·4,800,000 TROOPS, NET, IN FIELD BY NEXT SPRING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.-An army of 4,800,000 by next July, after all leductions have been made for casualties and rejections, is what the enlarged American military program calls for, General March explained this afternoon to the House appropriations committee in discussing the new seven-billion dollar army estimates.

There are now about 3,200,000 men under arms, General March said, and the plan is to call 2,700,000 of the new draft registrants to the colors between now and July.

THE WAR SITUATION

New York, Sept. 19 .- The Associated Press this morning issued the

In an attack, described as local in character, the British and French armies facing the Hindenburg line north and south of St. Quentin won mportant successes on Wednesday. At two points, one north of St. Quentin, and the other in the area near where Gen. Byng made his sensational advance last October before Cambral, the allied forces appear to have reached the main positions of the Germans. On this front the best maps fail to show the difficulties attending even a minor advance. For 17 months the Germans have been strengthening their positions, which they consider as being almost invulable. The fact, therefore, that the British and French succeeded in storming entrenched heights and strongly defended towns indicates that the blow was one in which large numbers of men were engaged, and may have been designed as of at

least the preliminary step to a nicve of more than ordinary import. On the Macedonian Front. French, Serbian and Greek forces have continued their advance on the Macedonian front and have taken a number of strongly defended prints in the mountainous regions east of Monastir.
