John Walsh, Returned, Dies at Morkin House.

FOUND DURING NIGHT

Was Lying On His Face On the Floor, and Died Quickly.

John Walsh, a returned soldier, died this morning at 7 o'clock in the Morkin House as a result of drinking wood alcohol and other substitutes for

Whiskey.

He went into the Morkin House on Monday evening and took a room for the night. At a late hour other persons in the house were disturbed by loud moanings from someone who seemed in pain. Investigation was made by Edward Morkin, proprietor of the Morkin House, who found Walsh lying on the floor on his face suffering intense pain. Before a doctor or ambulance could be summoned, the man succumbed.

John Walsh went overseas in 1915, where he served with the Canadian Army Dental Corps. He returned to Canada in the latter part of 1918 and was discharged from the army on January 2 of this year. He is a native of Stratford, and efforts will be made to get in touch with relatives there. His wife is employed at the Grigg House.

Coroner Robert Ferguson decided it was unnecessary to hold an inquest. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

EUROPEAN CIVILIZATION RESTS UPON INCREASED PRODUCTION AND BETTER CONTROL OF COAL

Herbert Hoover, Head of International Relief Organization, Declares Fate of Europe Is in Hands of Coal Miners and Owners-Europe Will Pro duce 443,000,000 Tons Next Year, While Amount Need ed Is Estimated at 614,369,-

Paris, Monday, Aug. 4.—Shipping and fuel representatives of France, Belgium, and Italy conferred with Herbert Hoover, head of the international relief organization here today, and decided to urge the supreme council of the peace conference to appoint a European coal commission to co-ordinate the distribution of European coal in an effort to avert what threatens to be a disaster. The meeting was held as a result of a warning given by Mr. Hoover in an address at the recent conference in London of the supreme economic council. He said that Europe's coal production was 35 per cent below normal, and that the United States coal could not offer relief because of the shortage of shipping. During his address, Mr. Hoover said:

Fate Depends on Coal.

"The fate of European civilization now rests in the hands of the coal miners and coal mine owners of Europe to an equal, if not to a greater degree than in the hands of the providers of foods and supplies during the next year."

At today's meeting Mr. Hoover declined to accept the permanent direction of the proposed European coal clined to accept the permanent direction of the proposed European coal commission, stating that he believed materially by the slight help which the United States can give.
