

PLACE 142ND COLORS, BEARING CITY CREST, IN ST. PAUL'S, NOV. 2

English Papers Commented On Crest of Flags From "Little London."

The colors of the 142nd Battalion are to be deposited in St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday, November 2. As Bishop D. Williams officiated at the presentation of the colors to the battalion before it left for overseas an effort will be made to have him take charge of the ceremony when the colors are placed in the cathedral.

A meeting will be held early next week to arrange the details. The executives are hoping that the meeting will be largely attended so that they might be assured that many ex-members will be present at the ceremony on the following Sunday.

A social evening was held in the club rooms on Dundas street last night. It was well attended by members and widows of ex-members of the battalion. Speaking of the disposition of the colors, President W. J. Widdicombe said that the colors had been presented to the battalion by Lady Beck in Queen's Park. The battalion had come down from Camp Borden in a special train for the ceremony.

They were the only colors to bear the crest of the city of London, and the fact that they bore the official crest was commented on by several of the larger papers in England, who spoke of them as the colors from "Little London."

They were not deposited in a cathedral in England, but were put in a safe vault because the battalion was broken up immediately after it had landed in that country. Although the battalion could not win distinction on the battlefield as a unit on this account, many of the members won individual honors. A large number won medals, among them being two winners of the Victoria Cross.

FAIR BOARD MEMBER ADVOCATES EXTENSION OF W. FAIR GROUNDS

Fair Outside City Unjust To Merchants, Says George McCormick.

The proposed extension of the Western Fair grounds and the purchase of land for a new site were only briefly considered by the directors of the Western Fair board yesterday afternoon. Just before the close of the meeting, it was decided that a special session should be held next Monday when a complete discussion of the question will be made. The principal reason for the postponement of the fair grounds question was the absence of the city of Ald. E. S. Little, who is the chairman of the special committee in charge of the matter. George G. McCormick, the extension of the present grounds to the east at a cost of about \$20,000, and the purchase of an entirely new site and the resultant erection of new buildings at a probable cost of \$125,000, the former was unanimously the more feasible.

He stated that the grounds should be removed to a larger and a permanent site, for it would not be right to curtail the exhibition on the present site in the future. As a temporary arrangement, he favored the extension of the grounds, east from Queen's Park. Another argument he used in favor of his plan was that any fair was bound to be more successful when situated inside the city limits, and in addition to the facility with which the transportation problem could thus be solved, it was more just to the merchants of the city to have the fair grounds situated inside of the city.

A long and complete report of the visit made by the secretary to the Birmingham and Atlanta fairs suggested many methods by which London's exhibition could be bettered in the future. The suggestions ranged in nature from those dealing with the smallest of exhibits to the architecture of the buildings and the plan of the grounds at the two American fair grounds.

Biggest Fair on Smallest Grounds. To the many secretaries of American fairs whom Secretary Hunt met during his visit, he stated yesterday that he was always introduced as coming from the city where the largest annual fair on the continent was staged upon the smallest amount of ground space.

The directors of the board presented Secretary Hunt, who was married just before leaving the city for Atlanta and Birmingham in the first part of this month, with a check for \$200 as a wedding present.

A number of communications and accounts were dealt with by the members.

PRINCE SWAPS FAGS, SHAKES ALL 'ROUND, IN 15 MINUTES HERE

Clasps Hands, Clean, Dirty, Big, Baby, at C. P. R.

"HULLO EDWARD!" YELLS Five Hundred On Platform, Including Ald. Bill Wilson, Who Gets Two Shakes.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was only in London for 15 minutes yesterday afternoon from 3:15 to 3:30 o'clock, but they were 15 of the happiest minutes that he and the large crowd of citizens present at the C.P.R. station experienced in all his stay in the city. The first thing he did was to salute the large Canadian flag, held in the hands of Wm. G. Moore.

The prince, dressed in a grey tweed suit, with a greenish tweed cap, looked on one side of his head, he shook hands with all near him. Dirty hands, clean hands, black hands, brown hands, and pink baby hands were all the same to the royal visitor who smiled winningly at the numerous pretty girls who were there to catch a glimpse of him and perchance clasp hands for a second.

Played No Favorites. However, His Highness played no favorites. Aged women with wrinkled brows and Ald. Bill Wilson got in a handshake. In fact Bill got in two handshakes, and after the train pulled out at last the prince was just as happy as the coy females who had given the prince's hand an extra squeeze.

As soon as the train stopped there was a mighty cheer from the 500 people present. (The reason that there was not more was because the fact of his coming was not generally known.) The prince was the chief of his city on the tail-end of the train, and he gift acknowledged the gift of a branch of beautifully colored maple leaves. He then shook hands with Mayor Somerville and other members of the city council, and then turned his attention to the public.

Hold Babies To Prince. There was a mad rush to the car to shake hands. Women held up little children in their arms and the prince leaned over and kissed each little hand gently. The grownups then got in their handshakes, after which the prince had a short conversation with the mayor.

"I've missed you all since I left London," said his highness. "I hope I'll come back to see you again before long." This brought forth prolonged cheers from the crowd that was close enough to hear the remark.

The prince then took up the hand-shaking again, using his left hand. Finally he had to desist after one particularly warmly clasped hand.

QUEEN ZEPHRA DRAWS ANOTHER DELIGHTED GRAND AUDIENCE

Second Performance Strengthens Success of Spectacular Operatic Production.

"Queen Zephra" scored again at the Grand Theatre last night when a second, equally delighted audience turned up to hear the fine music, dancing and acting rendered by the best local talent. The story of the play is a gripping one, even though the characters are allegorical, and given added opportunity for spectacular effect, both in stage setting and costume.

The Zephra Operatic Spectacle Company, under whose direction this production is given, has certainly a very fine and costly array of costumes and stage scenery, the like of which could not be seen in any other production of an ordinary local production, and although there is the added interest of local talent in the musical spectacle, the company of the Acadian Club with A. D. Jordan leading the grand orchestra, at the piano.

The company could have chosen no better "Queen Zephra" than Mrs. Catherine McCormick-Brickenden, who has been trained in acting and shows up exceptionally well in her role of supreme monarch in the play. Outstanding ability is displayed by Ernest N. Harding as King Dedus, whose haughty anger contrasts strongly with the beauty of the rest of the movement of the play. His vocal numbers and those of Charles Jolley, Marjorie Talbot, Carmen Larn, add greatly to the musical effect as do the numbers of Miss Luta Layman, Miss Clara Ferry, Miss Irene Parkinson and Miss Edna Barry.

Gorgeous costumes of white, sparkling with jewels, are worn by Mrs. McCormick, the Fairy Godmother, and little Miss Lenore Gilmore as Cupid. Spectacular scenes follow one upon another with startling effect. The grand finale, when the whole cast is seen assembled in the Garden of Dragons, with Cupid enthroned in the back. The ten thousand yards of serpentine confetti which is showered upon the dancers in the carnival scene also adds greatly to the spectacular effect of the production.

The solo dancing of Miss Madeline Bean and Miss Beattie Brown are an attraction in themselves, but these artists are only part of the magnificent carnival show when the queen is entertained by every variety of costume dance, some executed by children, and one comic number "The Newsboys," and a mob of small boys in rags and tatters, which again brought the house down last night.

"Queen Zephra" will be repeated this afternoon and evening.
