MURDERERS ESCAPE

Great Excitement Prevails in Cork As a Result of Murder.

London, March 20.—Details of the murder of the lord mayor of Cork indicate that a dozen men knocked at the door of the home of the lord mayor, Thomas MacGuerin. Mrs. MacGuerin opened the door and the men rushed in. Some of them held her, while others ran upstairs to the mayor's bedroom. ran upstairs to the mayor's bed They took him to the landing and shot him in the chest. They then fled hurriedly.

Mrs. MacGuerin telephoned immediately for a doctor and a priest. The mayor died soon after the arrival of
