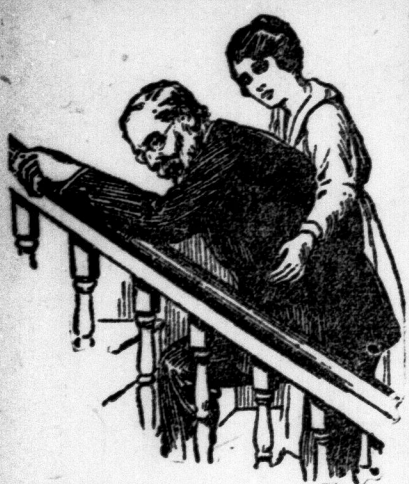

ROWELL TRIES TO WHITEWASH GOVT. SPENDING

Replies To Opposition Leader's Charges of Govt. Extravagance.

OPPOSITION IN LAUGHTER

Rowell's Efforts To Shove Spending On Soldiers' Requirements, Amusing.

OTTAWA, June 1.—In the House of Commons tonight Hon. N. W. Rowell answered criticism made by the leader of the Opposition and other Opposition members. The Government had not spent a single cent recklessly, he said, and there was no increase in the ordinary expenditure of the country. Money had been expended on pensions, soldiers' re-establishment, soldiers' settlement as well as on interest on public debt and civil service bonus. Pensions had been increased. Was this one of the items that Opposition members objected to? "If they had any manliness in them they would retract," Mr. Rowell remarked, amid tropical laughter from the Opposition. The president of the privy council referred to the charge that an expenditure of \$121,000,000 made by the Government remained unaccounted for. This amount was largely used to pay Canadian soldiers serving overseas, and the vouchers had not been received at the time the auditor-general's report was published. The reason for the non-receipt of the vouchers was that two vessels carrying a number of these had previously been torpedoed by submarines and the Government was afraid to trust any more on the ocean. Again Mr. Rowell said that the Opposition members who had made this charge should publicly retract it.

MAKES NO MOVE IN STREET CAR QUESTION

TORONTO, June 1.—Chairman McIntyre of the Ontario Railway Board, declined to intervene in the case of the city of Toronto, against the Toronto Street Railway Company this morning for better railway service. A count, he said, showed congestion at times, but the board, having regard to the standing capacity and the insistence of the public to get on cars rather than wait, felt that conditions did not warrant intervention.

Crazed by Cupid Woman Kills Four and Shoots Herself

Pennsylvania Woman Murders Married Man, His Wife and Child, and Her Own Daughter.

PHILADELPHIA, June 1.—Madly in love with a married man, according to the police, Mrs. Mary Frances Dunlop, living on a farm near West Grove, Pa., shot and killed J. Leroy Eichelberger, the object of her infatuation, as he lay asleep in bed with his wife and infant, early today, and then drove to her home and killed her eleven-year-old daughter and herself. Mrs. Dunlop was 36 years old, and Eichelberger 30.

McKeown, London, a lot on Erie street; E. Earnshaw has sold the May property to Mrs. Foley, London.

HEVEY GETS \$4,000 DAMAGES FOR LIBEL FROM JAS. SIMPSON

Toronto Court Verdict Awards Sum To Former Labor Official.

TORONTO, June 1.—W. J. Hevey, a former secretary of the Toronto District Trades and Labor Council, obtained a verdict at the assizes here this afternoon against James Simpson, editor of a labor paper here and a well-known advocate of labor and prohibition, for \$4,000 damages for libel and slander. Hevey sued for \$10,000 damages. The suit was the outcome of a charge made by Simpson at a trades council meeting here some months ago that Hevey and Arthur E. O'Leary, a former president of the Toronto District Trades and Labor Council, had conspired with representatives of local manufacturers during the numerous strikes last summer to accept \$5,000 with which to start a labor paper that would not be so antagonistic to the employers as the paper edited by Simpson. O'Leary also brought an action against Simpson for \$10,000 damages, and the O'Leary case was tried a short time ago. The jury in that case awarded the plaintiff \$1,000 damages. O'Leary's counsel had his bill taxed today at Osgoode Hall at \$902.00, and Simpson will have to pay this in addition to the \$1,500 damages and Simpson's own counsel.

MURDERER MAY BE HIDING NEAR BORDER

Sandwich Police Are Making a County-Wide Search.

WINDSOR, June 1.—Sandwich police were today appealed to to aid in the hunt for a Washington, D. C., man alleged to have murdered Marie, the 12-year-old daughter of Patrick Kane, 107 Wickens street, Detroit, by poison, to have abducted Kane's other daughter, Gertrude, aged 13, and her aunt through the medium of a forged letter. Kane, in asking assistance, said the man was last seen driving a green auto and had been traced as far as Detroit. He was believed to have crossed the river with a woman and a girl, and to be in hiding somewhere on the Canadian side. The border police instituted a county-wide search tonight for the fugitive.

MYSTERY OF BOAT REMAINS UNSOLVED

HAMILTON, June 1.—The police today failed to solve the mystery of the alleged disappearance of four people on the bay last night. The captain of a tug towing an oil tanker into the harbor reported to the police that a sailboat containing four people crossed the towline of his tug. He said two men jumped out of the boat, and two women were left in the craft. He showed down his tug and returned to the scene of the accident, but found no trace of the boat or its occupants.

REJECTS PLEA FOR A MANDATE OVER ARMENIA

U. S. House of Representatives Refuse President Wilson's Request.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—President Wilson's plea for an American mandate over Armenia was rejected in the United States House of Representatives today by a vote of more than two to one. Thirteen Democrats cast their votes with the united Republican membership on the final roll call and the resolution "respectfully declining" to grant congressional authority for the mandate was adopted 52 to 23 in the form drafted by the Republican leaders. The resolution will be sent to the House tomorrow, and the leaders there plan to adopt it without change on Thursday. They say they hope for as decisive a majority as was given on the measure today.

SIX-YEAR-OLD GALT BOY CLIMBS HYDRO POLE; BADLY BURNED

Grabbed Live Wire—Branches Saved Boy's Life.

GALT, June 1.—Climbing a hydro pole, 6-year-old Allen Tremaine of Cedar street stood on the iron braces and then grabbed hold of one of the live wires, with the result that his left hand was burned an inch deep between the thumb and forefinger, while the soles of his feet were also burned and he sustained slight burns on his chest. Fortunately the lad in falling fell into a tree, which broke his fall and no doubt saved him from certain death.

RECORD NUMBER OF POLICE CASES AT GUELPH

Total of 404 Nearly Equals Whole of Year 1919.

GUELPH, June 1.—The month of May broke all previous records for the number of cases heard in the month at the police court. The report of Chief Rae shows that there were 139 cases heard before Magistrate Watt, the largest number in the history of the police court. Since January 1, 404 offenders have been brought up, which is just slightly under the total number of cases during the whole year 1919.

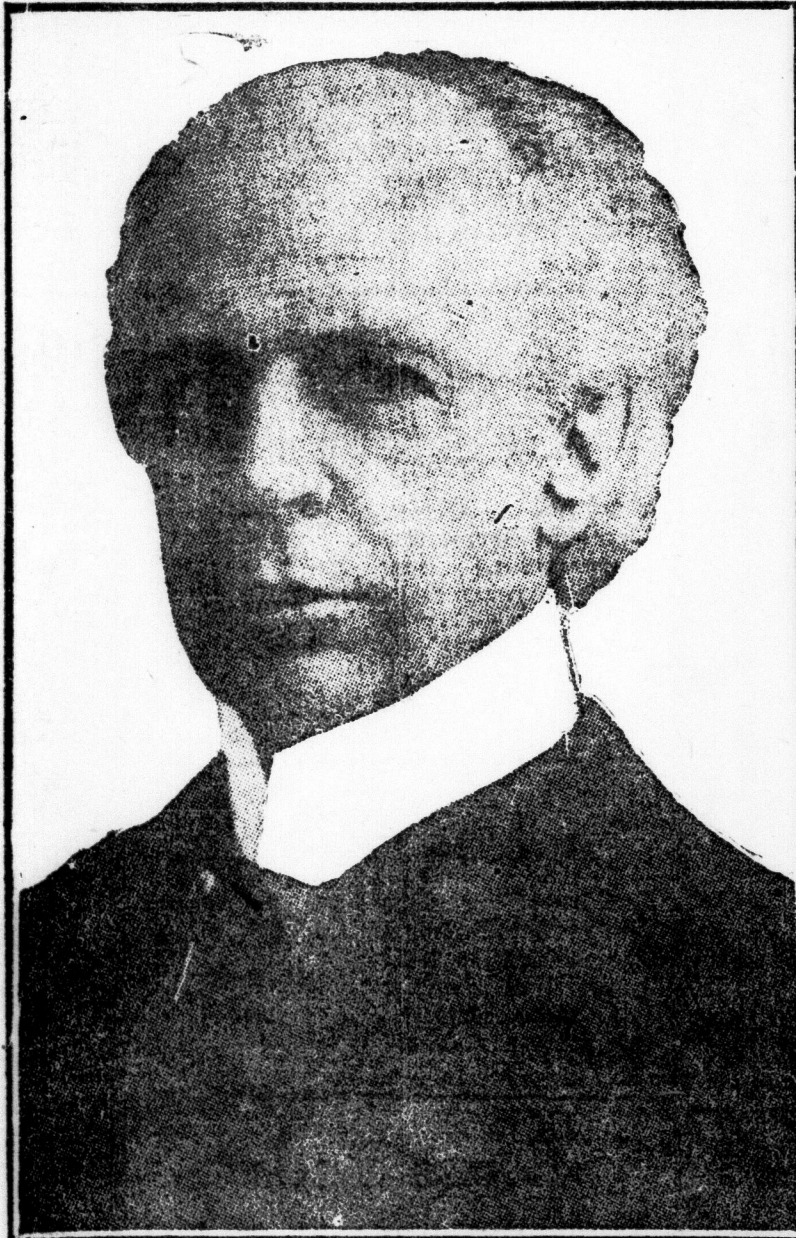
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
