CURTIS BLAMES MORSE FOR BANK'S FAULTS

Admits Ovardraft of \$40,000,000 on Executive's Responsibility -Split Occurs.

ing laws, came to-day with the swearing in of Curtis as the first witness of the defence.

Before calling the former president of the suspended Bank of North America to the stand in his own behalf, former Judge W. M. K. Olcott, Curtis attorney, announced that he had persuaded his client to "tell all the facts."

Overdrafts \$40,000,000.

Mr. Curtis testified that as cashier of the Bank of North America he had over certified cheques to the amount of \$40,000,000.

Morse was at the time vice-president and director of the bank. During an absence abroad Mr. Morse was deposed by President Edwards. Upon his return he obtained control of the bank by purchasing a majority of the stock, Mr. Curtis recounted, and after ousting Edwards justified Curtis as president. Morse, the witness testified, carried a balance of between \$100,000 and \$150,000 with the bank, and had brought a great many customers and depositors to it. When the Caroll loan on 4000 shares of ice stock came up for renewal in the name of Braun of Primrose & Braun, Mr. Morse had instructed him, the witness said, to put it thru, telling him that he would stand back of it and guarantee it. At the time. Curtis testified, he supposed back of it and guarantee it. At the time, Curtis testified, he supposed Morse to be a very rich man, having heard his wealth estimated at \$22,000,-

Morse to be a very rich man, having heard his wealth estimated at \$22,000,000. It was, therefore, not extraordinary, he thought, that he should accept Morse's guarantee as fully protective.

The witness then went into details relative to the transactions whereby 2000 of the 4000 shares of ice securities held by the bank had been sold to Mrs. Gelsheen and later disposed of by het at a profit of \$24,580. The remaining 2000 shares had also netted a profit of \$24,580, and this Mr. Morse had turned into the bank, refusing to accept it for himself, altho clearly entitled to it. Other loans, with ice stock as collateral, had been made by the witness, he declared, notably those of Davidson Brown, but always on the recommendation of Mr. Morse, and after he had signified that he stood back of them and guaranteed them.

PAINLESS TEETH FILLING.

A new method of filling teeth, that is expected to revolutionize dentistry work here, was explained to a large gathering of "workers on teeth," by Dr. Weston A. Price of Cleveland, Chio, last night at their regular monthly

The new method to take the place of the old time-worn, heart-rending, pounding of the filling into the teeth, is to fit in a little lump of precious metal carefully cast and moulded to size. This is placed in the cavity with Boot and Shoemakers Union.
