Joe Kelley is Coming Back To Manage the Toronto Club

Frank Bowerman Will Succeed to Leadership of the Boston Club—Stalling's Selling His Newark Club Stock.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(Special.)—Frank Bowerman, the ex-Giant backstop, will manage the Boston National League team next season, and Joe Kelley, present leader of the team, will go back to his former managerial berth of the Toronto Club of the Eastern League. This was learned at the meeting of the moguls of the Eastern League this afternoon.

Most of the Eastern League owners seem to be impressed with the idea that it will be the proper thing to have playing managers for their teams next season. Toronto would like nothing better than to secure Joe Kelley again to run the team for them. He won the championship of the league two years ago, and is very popular with the Canucks. George B. Dovey, the president of the club, is anxious to secure the services of the proper man to handle the team again.

Eastern Circuit the Best.

The Eastern League circuit as it is arranged at present is one of the best in baseball. All of the cities are of good population, and success in Rochester, Montreal, Jersey City and Toronto, with the natural revival of interest, which will follow, would make the league one of the most prosperous in the sport.

While the Eastern will lose some good players by the usual draft and purchase, so much material is likely to be available in the spring season that there is no fear of the Eastern's ability to put eight teams in the race better matched and more competitive than the clubs which competed in 1908.

PAT POWERS RE-ELECTED SALARY IS DOUBLED

Baltimore Awarded Pennant—McCaferry One of the Directors—Deals

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The annual meeting of the Eastern League of Professional Ball Clubs was held at the Victoria Hotel to-day. There were two sessions, the first being a meeting of the directors, and the second the general meeting, lasting until to-night.

President Powers presided, and all the clubs were represented. The championship pennant for 1908 was awarded to the Baltimore Club, and the standing of the clubs, which has been in dispute, was announced officially to the press.

W. L. Powers, president of the Baltimore Club, was elected to the position of secretary-treasurer, and his salary was doubled, so that he will receive \$6000 for the ensuing year. The directors agreed to prepare three schedules for the coming season, each of which will call for 154 games with a playing period of 155 days. The schedule in future must be adopted on or before March 1 of each year.

The president was empowered to appoint a committee of three to invite the American Association to co-operate with them in securing more generous legislation of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues in Chicago two years hence.

The following were elected directors: Messrs. Ed Hanlon, Baltimore; A. B. Potter, New York; J. J. McCaffrey, Toronto; and J. J. McCaffrey, Toronto.

Several deals for new managers were discussed, but no definite action was taken. Among them was that of Geo. T. Stallings of Newark for the New York Americans, and that of Fred Thompson of Toronto for the Toronto Argonauts.
