Washington, July 26.—Leaders representing the wet and dry forces in the Senate agreed to consider Senator Sheppard's motion for prohibition constitutional amendment next week. It was then Tuesday and vote on it Wednesday. Sheppard had agreed to accept an amendment fixing a limit of five years on the states which must act upon the amendment. This limit was suggested by leaders opposed to prohibition.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a lot in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon the land and a homestead in each of three years. A homesteader may live in a claim line mine on his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, and the residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre.

Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years. A homesteader may live in a claim line mine on his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, and the residence is performed in the vicinity.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre.

WHOLESALE FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Raspberries.—Raspberries were shipped in larger quantities yesterday than in any previous day, some very poor ones selling as low as 13c per box, while one shipment of exceptionally choice ones from Otto Schoon, Aldershot, to White & Co., brought 25c per box. The bulk of the good raspberries, sold at 20c per box, with some not quite so good going at 15c and 16c per box.

Strawberries.—Strawberries from 11c to 15c per box, according to quality.

Cherries.—Sweet cherries only shipped in very light quantities, and sold at 60c to \$1 and \$1.25 per six-quart basket, and \$1.25 to \$2 per 11-quart basket. The four varieties selling at 60c to 85c per 11-quart basket, and 50c to 60c per six-quart basket. One shipment of choice quality Montmorency from Hunter Bros. of Grimsby to Stronach & Sons selling at \$1.25 per 11-quart basket.

Blueberries.—Blueberries were quite heavy yesterday, the bulk selling at \$1.25 to \$1.75 per 11-quart basket, a shipment of extra choice quality from the north shore to Clemes Bros. bringing \$2 to \$2.25 per 11-quart basket.

Black currants.—Black currants commanded a wide range of prices, according to the variety. The bulk of the fruit, sold at 75c to \$1, and the 11-quart at \$1.25 to \$2, and there were some of such poor quality that they were sold at 50c to 60c per box.

Red currants.—Red currants also varied according to the size of the fruit. They sold at 80c to 75c per 11-quart basket, also at 5c to 7c per box.

Gooseberries.—Gooseberries brought from 50c to 55c per 11-quart basket, some extra choice lots bringing 60c per six-quart and \$1.25 per 11-quart.

Beans.—Beans again received their bump, and sold as low as 25c per 11-quart basket, but also reached 35c and 40c per 11-quart.

Green peas.—Green peas were almost unobtainable, a few sold at 50c to 60c per 11-quart basket, but they had to be sold at a price that was only a small profit.

Vegetable marrow shipments are on the increase. They brought 25c to 30c per 11-quart basket, according to quality.

Tomatoes.—Tomatoes were heavily in the price weakening slightly. The bulk of the No. 1 grade sold at \$1.75 to \$2 per 11-quart basket, the No. 2 grade at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 11-quart basket, and the No. 3 grade at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket.

Cucumbers.—Cucumbers declined and sold at \$1 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket.

Lemons.—Lemons advanced. The Verdillia yesterday, 25c to 30c per 11-quart basket, and the others 20c to 25c per 11-quart basket.

Green Peppers.—Green Peppers were heavily in the price weakening slightly. The bulk of the No. 1 grade sold at \$1.75 to \$2 per 11-quart basket, the No. 2 grade at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 11-quart basket, and the No. 3 grade at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket.

Potatoes.—Potatoes were heavily in the price weakening slightly. The bulk of the No. 1 grade sold at \$1.75 to \$2 per 11-quart basket, the No. 2 grade at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 11-quart basket, and the No. 3 grade at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket.

Onions.—Onions were heavily in the price weakening slightly. The bulk of the No. 1 grade sold at \$1.75 to \$2 per 11-quart basket, the No. 2 grade at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 11-quart basket, and the No. 3 grade at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket.
