MORE SURVIVORS REACH TORONTO

Forty - One Burned and Wounded Refugees Arrived in City Yesterday.

FEAR FOR ENGLEHART

Women and Children Ordered to Leave Town on Wednesday.

Another tragic group of survivors from the northern forest arrived in Toronto yesterday morning on the Grand Trunk Cobalt special. These, to the number of 41, got off the train looking in many cases, the worse for their terrible experiences. Many have wounds and burns that required dressing and medical attention, while the shattered nerves and dream-like daze of others will be cured only by time and kindness.

As to the number of those who have lost their lives in the catastrophe, the survivors are unwilling to make any estimate except to say that the number will be appalling. They all express their desire to be reunited with their loved ones, and also state that the fire is not yet over.

That the fire was only half a mile from Englehart last night, and that all the women and children were ordered to leave the town Wednesday afternoon, was the statement of Mrs. P. S. Gray, who arrived in Toronto at noon yesterday on the national train, and who became acquainted with the survivors and taken to their home at 216 Wilbur avenue.

The widow said she did not wait to be told to leave, but along with her husband had some of her clothes packed up ready to leave on the first available train. She became very much worried about her husband with blackness of night by a dense pall of smoke and sparks commenced to fall on the northern end of the town. When the doctor and the mayor saw what might happen, the men were ordered to remain and fight the fire, while the doctor had the women and children notified to leave the town.

Mrs. Gray was very much upset and told her friends that she did not mind about her husband's safety, but was very much worried about her husband who remained with the other survivors.

A NATION TRANSFORMED. Beginning of Third Year of War Sees Empire Assured of Success.

Two years today since war was declared and looking about for some compensation for the great struggle in which millions have fallen.
