### ICE IN NIAGARA RIVER INTERFERING WITH POWER

Ice in the Niagara River, which is  
curtailing production by the provin-  
cial Hydro system, is intensifying the  
situation resulting from a big short-  
age and a rapidly growing demand  
for power. Toronto's needs call for  
60,000 horsepower, but the city is now  
getting along on 35,000.

H. H. Cousins, manager of the To-  
ronto Hydro-Electric system, explains  
that the city cannot cut off alternate  
street lights to save power, but the  
power of certain circuits has been re-  
duced alternately so that the short-

### age will not fall entirely on a few dis- tricts. Everything possible, he said, is being done to keep up the supply in the business district.

It is predicted that on his return

to operate it up to capacity.

### SMALLPOX EPIDEMIC IS ON THE DECLINE

Only 11 new smallpox cases were re-  
ported at the city hall in the last 24  
hours, which indicates that the epidemic  
is on the decline. About 1000 persons  
are still held under quarantine because  
of exposure.

Replying to the suggestion that infec-  
tion might result from garbage taken  
from houses containing smallpox pa-  
tients, Dr. Hastings states that the virus  
can live only a short time outside the  
human body and that the danger from  
this source is negligible. As a matter  
of precaution, however, he said it was  
the rule to burn garbage in the furnace  
of the houses containing the patients.

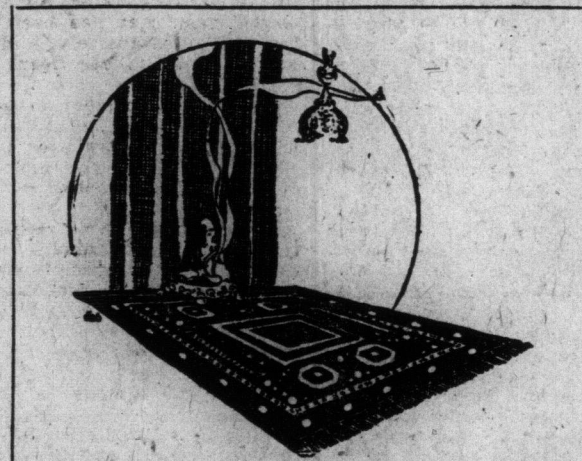

### Increase in Sugar Prices

Send Chocolates Away Up

Fredericton, N.B., Jan. 10.—The ad-  
vance of 2 1-2 cents per pound in  
sugar prices has already been reflect-  
ed in prices of standard brands of  
fancy chocolates, which will now be  
retailing at \$1 per pound, local deal-  
ers declared today.

Following the advance of 2 1-2 cents  
per pound in the price of sugar, and  
the increase in flour prices the whole-  
sale prices on all candies have ad-  
vanced from two to ten cents per  
pound.

Sweet biscuits have already ad-  
vanced also, the cheaper brands going  
up one cent a pound today while the  
better kinds are showing greater ad-  
vances.

Retailers are now giving 6 1-2  
pounds of sugar for a dollar here.

### PRINTING CRAFTSMEN OR- GANIZE.

Printing craftsmen, at a well-re-  
presented meeting yesterday after-  
noon, decided to organize an associa-  
tion to be known as the Toronto  
Printing Craftsmen, and to be af-  
filiated with similar organizations on  
the other side.

Ferry R. Long of the  
Curtis Publishing Co., Philadelphia,  
made a short talk on the objects and  
benefits of these associations to the  
printing craft, after which the follow-  
ing officers were elected: pro tem,  
President, Charles Keast of Southern  
Ontario; secretary-treasurer, C. W.  
Perry of Grip Engraving; press repre-  
sentative, George Smith of Saturday  
Night. A general meeting of heads  
of allied printing trades will be held  
Monday.
