# TO STOP DIVORCE EVIL IN CANADA

Senator Cloran Introduces Bill That Offending Party in Suit Cannot Remarry in the Dominion or Outside Legally.

(Special to The Telegraph.)

Ottawa, March 24—Senator Cloran has introduced in the senate a bill entitled an act to restrict the evils of divorce. The bill provides that the offending party to a marriage contract shall have no right to

re-marry in Canada after obtaining a divorce from the Canadian parliament, and further that if such party remarries outside the dominion such remarriage shall be considered invalid and illegal and the remarried party shall be considered a bigamist within Canadian territory.

Woodstock, N. B., March 24—Information has just been received of the death in Brainerd (Minn.) today of Fred Colwell, son of the late John Colwell of

Northampton after a short illness from pneumonia. Mrs. John Craig of Northampton is his mother, and he leaves a sister and two half brothers. He was a machinist by trade and has been absent from home eleven years.

The funeral of Mrs. Mary Stewart, who died on Sunday, was held this morning, and was largely attended. Services were held by Rev. Fr. McMurray in St. Gertrude's church and the burial made in the Catholic cemetery.

The body of the late Mrs. Amalia Harris, who died on Sunday, was taken to Temperance Vale, York county, this morning by her husband for interment.

## THREE MONTREAL ITALIANS FREED OF MURDER CHARGE

Montreal, March 24—Three Italians, Francesco Cavarri, Giovanni Mancini and Maria Arta, were this afternoon acquitted on the charge of murdering Italian, Ernesto Cassieri, last month.

Cassieri made an ante mortem statement in which he accused the trio of murdering him, but there was no corroborative evidence of this and the three were emphatic that Cassieri had committed suicide.

The court of King's bench has been kept busy for several weeks hearing cases of murderous assault by Italians and there will be three more cases on the docket.

# Grave Charge Against Jackson

New York, March 23—Attorney General William Schuyler Jackson is accused under oath of having demanded that Frank White, receiver of the Hamilton Bank, should share equally with him the aggregate of the fees and commissions earned by Mr. White while acting in that capacity.

That assertion was sworn to by Mr. White when he was forced to appear as an unwilling witness before the county grand jury.

Owing to the fact that Frank White owed his appointment as receiver for the Hamilton Bank directly to Attorney General Jackson, whose deputy he had been until he resigned that office to accept the receivership, and to the additional fact that other receivers were bestowed through Mr. Jackson's influence upon persons who were his close political or office associates, this is regarded as one of the most serious accusations yet lodged against the attorney general's administration.

The news of the arrest caused a panic in the provincial branches of the Credit Minier Et Industriel Bank, directed by Rochette. Depositors clamored all day at the branches, but no money was paid out to them.

Rochette conducted a big financial newspaper, Le Financier, at a cost of about \$30,000 a month by means of which he was better able to dispose of stock in this various companies.

One of the directors of the Credit Minier states that Rochette's affairs are solvent. He says that Rochette has nearly \$2,000,000 deposited in the Bank of France, and that the Credit Minier and Franco-Spanish Banks have the working capitals of all Rochette's companies in their safes.

M. Bourget, while reaffirming his irreconcilable opposition to the principle of divorce says he is not surprised either at the senate's action or the expression of public opinion.

"A student of moral science," he said, "I long ago foresaw what France was coming to. We are hurrying toward 'free union.' France, as demonstrated by the polemic which has just closed, is divided into two camps—one, the feebler, opposes divorce; the other, the stronger, favors free union.

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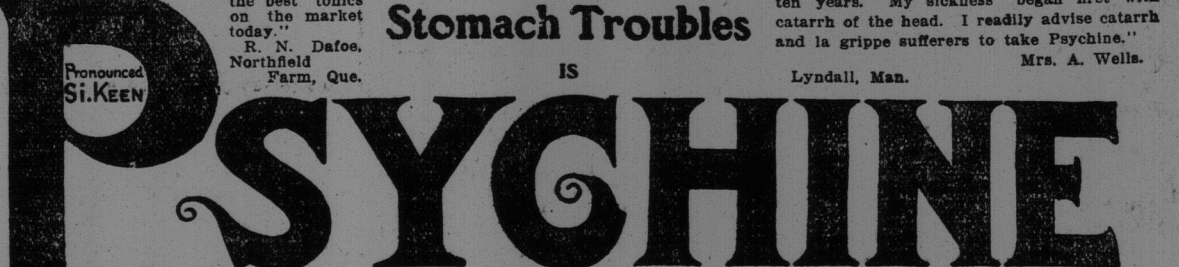

## HIGH PRICES FOR LEGISLATORS' VOTES

\$10,000 Offered to Each Senator That Will Oppose Gov. Hughes' Anti-Gambling Bill.

Albany, March 23—The state legislature opened on the verge of a serious scandal as a result of the persistent rumor that large sums of money have been sent here to defeat Governor Hughes' race track gambling legislation.

"Never in the four years that I have been here have I seen such an open and bold-faced attempt" said one senator who seemed on the Armstrong insurance investigation this morning. The price of votes has been declared to be at least \$10,000, and higher figures are whispered, coincident with the rumor, moreover, comes the manifest fact that the bills seem to be hopelessly lost. From 28 to 30 votes against them in the senate seem to have been secured. Never since the fight began has the outlook been so dark for the governor's programme.

The governor on his part is showing no intention of abandoning the fight. Again and again he has declined to accept the amendment which makes the new law take effect Sept. 1, thus saving this year's racing and the prospect of a long and bitter fight is growing.

# BRITISH PREMIER RAPIDLY SINKING

Very Little Encouragement to Be Derived from Bulletins

Balfour Calis Daily to Inquire After His Former Foe—Haldane Mentioned as Probable Successor to Asquith in the Exchequer—Winston Churchill and Lloyd-George Accused of Treachery.

New York, March 24—The Herald has received the following cable despatch from London: Members of all shades of politics are becoming more and more concerned every day over the declining strength of the Prime Minister.

The Prime Minister is a constant victim to Downing street, going there every day. But no messages of sympathy or anxious inquiry are more welcome to the suffering premier than those personally

are hard at work arranging for a reshuffle in the Liberal cabinet. Mr. John Morley would like to go to the Exchequer, but it is not believed he has the knowledge of financial affairs requisite in that position. It is now suggested that Mr. Haldane would make an admirable chancellor of the exchequer, and his friends declare that he is the only member of the ministry who understands the Asquith budget and scheme for old-age pensions. Mr. Haldane is also keen on getting his promotion, for the chancellorship is a more important post than his present one. But who is to fill Mr. Haldane's shoes? It is difficult to think of anyone who could carry through his army scheme, for, truth to tell, hardly any other minister understands it.

Unpleasant allegations have been made against Mr. Lloyd-George and Mr. Winston Churchill, both exceedingly young members of the Liberal ministry. It is hinted that they have both been intriguing with a view to the formation of a new party. It is well known that all is not harmony within the Liberal ranks. Mr. Winston Churchill wants to get into the cabinet, but he does not know the way. If he takes cabinet rank he will, according to constitutional rules, have to face the storm and stress of re-election. To judge from the results of the recent bye-elections his re-election as the member for Manchester is doubtful. It is understood that he is in favor of an early dissolution, so that he can choose a safer seat and demand a higher position in the new ministry.

The young politician is gifted with a good-humored, self-complacency which never fades, and a belief in his own genius as a statesman which so far has never wavered. He thinks himself a man born to set the world right throughout an entire generation, and he has a superb contempt for the prosaic steps by which ordinary people arrive at a conclusion. He was of great use to Campbell-Bannerman, but it is doubtful whether he would get on so well with the astute lawyer, Mr. Asquith, if that gentleman were called upon to take the reins of office as premier.

And what are the misgivings about Mr. Lloyd-George? Since he became president of the board of trade the little Welshman has shown a very open disregard for the teachings of the Cobden Club. Indeed, he has been tearfully written down by The Spectator as at least a protectionist. One allegation against him is that he is prepared to formulate some positive tariff proposals to meet a great national evil.

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
