THEY ARE LEARNING
Canadian protests against the action of British judges in dismissing criminals upon their agreeing to emigrate to Canada are having their effect. The Canadian Gazette (London), records with approbation the action of a Montreal magistrate, who discharged a recently arrived English woman accused of theft and then directed that she be placed on board a pleasure boat bound for England and warned never to return to this country. "It is good for Englishmen to taste a little of their own medicine," says the Gazette.
The Gazette proceeds to chronicle the conversion of the Recorder of London, who has been a frequent offender against Canada and who at one time seemed hopelessly in the grasp of the delusion that the Dominion was created as a penal colony. "Special complaint," it says, "has more than once been made in respect to the attitude of the Recorder of London as president at the Old Bailey, that he has acquiesced in arrangements whereby Canada has been made the dumping ground, sometimes with the aid of court money, of men who have been guilty of theft and other worse offenses, and who, but for their emigration, would have found their way into an English jail. The Recorder has at last been brought to see that in acquiescing, even though silently, in arrangements of this kind he is doing Canada a gross injustice. In a recent case at the Old Bailey a shoemaker, seventeen years of age, pleaded guilty to stealing a watch from his mother, and it was urged that there was a strain of insanity in the family. "I suggest that he should be sent to Canada," said counsel, whereupon the recorder made the following entirely sensible remarks:—
"I shall certainly not be a party to any arrangement of that kind. Recently I commented to a boy convicted before me being sent to Canada, and this was the subject of a strong protest from the Canadian Government to the Foreign Office. (The judge evidently meant the Colonial Office.) Canada, naturally, very strongly objected to having sent there such emigrants. The Salvation Army, or other emigration agency, may deal with the matter; but I will not sanction any such arrangement. I shall sentence him to six months' imprisonment, without hard labor."
"Other English justices have offended in the same way. With the example of the Recorder of London before them we may hope that they will now turn over a new leaf."
They are not particularly ready to take a hint in England; but they are evidently learning, and over these impressions are leaning.

SPECTRES
Several Canadian newspapers and many across the line are speculating about the probability of a general uprising of Mahomedans, one effect of which would be the loss of India to the British Empire. The excuse for the discussion is the British foreign secretary's warning about Egypt, which caused a temporary drop in Canada. The pan-Islam peril is described by the Wall Street Journal as a spectre and nothing more. The Journal's observations are well fortified by facts which, as it says, have been overlooked by amateur observers, who seem able to face any problem except a simple sum in arithmetic.
"Correspondents," says the Journal, "who see a world's yellow peril in the fight of a country which desires nothing so much as to mind its own business, a revolution in France in a local coal strike, or the collapse of the British empire in anything from the Boer war to the birth-rate, are all too plentiful. They are really the only dangerous feature in the situation. If somebody shouts 'fire' loud enough he can usually produce effects on a theatre audience which render a constitution quite unnecessary."
It has been pointed out in these columns before that the difficulty in Egypt is in the coincidence of an intelligible movement for nationalization with a revival of the Mahomedan in one form or another has kept the Sudan in a ferment for the last thirty years. The step from this to a world-wide movement of Mahomedans is so wide that it is not worth considering. It has the same reference and possibilities of forecast, as far as the markets of the world are concerned, as the crop conditions likely to prevail in America a hundred years hence.
"Here is a typical 'imbecility': When Russia is fully occupied with Great Britain in the East, the Sultan of Turkey will rise and proclaim himself Caliph. The
