British Support Soccer.
 London, June 6—The complete statement of receipts from the soccer games in the Lancashire and Midland sections of the English league during the season which has just concluded, shows the large amount of \$382,150 taken at the gates. Of this sum \$50,925 went to the government tax and \$12,220 to charities, while league management expenses absorbed \$2,995. The Midland section gates produced \$147,210, of which \$22,545 went to government tax, \$5,690 to charities, and \$1,120 to league management. The Lancashire section figures are: Gate receipts, \$184,940; government tax, \$37,980; charities, \$7,300, and league management, \$1,440.

As an illustration of the great interest in soccer football these results are satisfactory, especially when the fact that soldiers are charged but half price, and wounded soldiers admitted free, are taken into account.

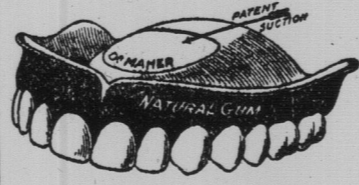

KARNESKY AT THE FRONT

Able Man Who is Working to Sober the Intoxicated Russian Giant.

(N. Y. Times Editorial)
 It is a gigantic task that Minister Kernesky has undertaken, but he is performing it with vigor and spirit. The Russian generals have made their appeals to their men to give up dreaming about peace and begin to fight again, and in some cases these appeals have been effective. Now, however, comes a Socialist leader and a member of the Petrograd government to make the same appeal, and it must be far more effective with those soldiers who have been misled by agitators. Kernesky divides the misleaders of Russia into two classes, conspirators and dreamers. The conspirators, he tells the soldiers, and secret reactionaries seeking to bring about a return of despotism, and knowing that the surest way to get it is to induce the soldiers to "demand everything immediately." The other class consists of "idealists who, gazing intently at the sky, drag in his first despair at finding the revolution poisoned by conspirators and dreamers. Kernesky wished that he had died at the moment of the overthrow of Czarism, that he had not lived to see his hopes frustrated. He recovered from that black depression and is now doing a man's work to sober the intoxicated and bring its reeling feet back into the path of progress. The surest proof that his work is effective is that the wreckers of the revolution are denouncing him as a would-be Bonaparte.

SELECTIVE DRAFT OF WEALTH NEEDED

If Men Must Be Taken the Money Should Also Be Made to Serve

 When "conscription of wealth" is spoken of, many profess not to know what it means, and pretend to believe that it means the confiscation of all property. Nobody suggests the conscription of all wealth, just as nobody suggests the conscription of all men and the sending of all the male population away to war. But if there is to be a selective draft of fit men whose services are necessary for the country's listing will no longer do, then voluntary giving will no longer do, either. If the nation is to go into the homes and take the men it needs, it should not hesitate to go into the offices and take the money that is required. It is, we think, greatly unfortunate that it should be necessary to prevent the nation putting itself in the position of making more free with some men's lives than with other men's money.

Some of our citizens are making 100 per cent profit at a time when 400,000 other citizens are risking their lives at a dollar per day. Another 100,000 men are now to be called out to risk their lives at a dollar per day. That being the actual fact at this moment, should it be necessary to argue the case further? Is it not an absolute necessity of the situation that the conscription of some men shall be accompanied by firm and just regulation of the war-dealings of others, so that the scandal of this thing shall not embitter the public mind?

Many of those who are making inordinate gains are doing so directly or indirectly because of the war. Those who serve their country suffer deprivations and losses. Those who serve only themselves find these years of world disaster bonanza years. The drafting of men on an equitable plan will do much to equalize the risks of war fairly among all the people, rich and poor. But at this moment the nation should declare that all people must serve the country in one way or another, and that no man among us shall serve only himself and coin the sorrow of his neighbors to gains for himself. The thing has been a scandal too long, and business men have too long deceived themselves and bribed their consciences.

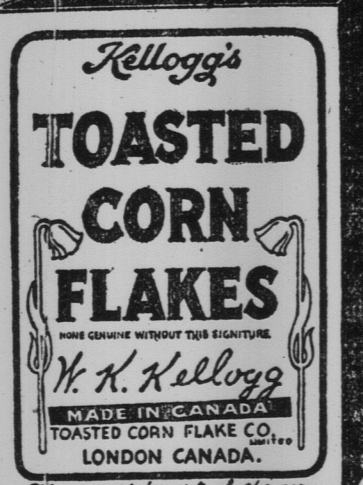
