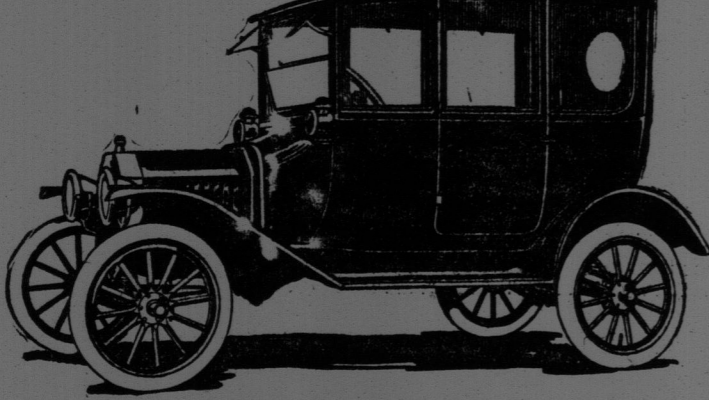


Don't Send Your Boy Into Professional Baseball, Hugh Fullerton's Advice To Fathers



By Hugh S. Fullerton. "My boy is now nineteen, and will graduate in June. He has played on his high school and prep school baseball and football teams, is a good hitter, the best player on any team he ever has been with and has played ball with strong vacation teams. He wants to go into professional ball. I want him to enter college. We had a long talk on the subject. He will listen to my advice and I believe will accept my decision."

"Even the high-priced players complain of the difficulty of saving. The constant drain of expenses is much higher than one would think. A semi-professional man must spend more than a private individual. A \$3,000-a-year man has a hard time saving \$200 a year. I know men who have had salaries of from \$3,500 to \$7,500 for seven or eight years who have only a few thousands laid by."
