

# NOVA SCOTIA AMATEUR CLUBS TO MEET AT TRURO ON DEC. 7

## VOTE ON NEW BRANCH AGAIN TO BE TAKEN

Will Try to Learn True Sentiment Regarding Separate Body

THE Nova Scotia amateur clubs are going ahead with vigor in the formation of a separate branch of the A. A. U. of C. for the handling of sports in that province. A meeting at Truro of representatives of the clubs has been called for December 7 when an expression of opinion regarding the new body will be asked of the clubs.

A. C. Pettinas, provisional president of the new organization, has sent a letter to each of the clubs in which he says that the notice sent to all clubs asking them to be present at the Truro meeting on December 7 should be given their best consideration. If they do not feel that the new movement will be to their advantage given official recognition by the Canadian Union, then they will be perfectly justified in declining to attend. If, however, they are in favor of the new branch, all of which will be placed before them at the Truro meeting. Nothing will be hidden. This is their matter and each club through its representative has a right to know what is going on.

## COLLEGE TITLE WON BY TORONTO VARSITY

Defeats Queens by 8-0 Score To Play Ottawa for Eastern Crown

TORONTO, Nov. 28.—Outplaying their opponents in every department of the game and throughout almost every minute of the tussle, University of Toronto plunged, kicked and ran their way to an 8-0 victory over Queen's University in the Inter-Collegiate Rugby Football Union final at Varsity Stadium Saturday afternoon.

The blue and white triumph gave them their first inter-collegiate title since 1921 and ended the four-year reign of Queen's who had dominated the college circuit during that period. Besides giving them the inter-collegiate title, Varsity's win entitled them to meet Ottawa Senators here next Saturday for the championship of Eastern Canada.

Although they have won the inter-collegiate title, injuries received in yesterday's struggle will probably seriously affect Varsity's chances of going further in the quest for the Dominion title. Harvey Bales had a fracture and dislocation of the right ankle; Frank Hutchinson's right shoulder bone was broken; Rykert's right wrist was broken and Warren Snyder had two stitches sewn over his right eye.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28.—By a score of 11 points to 5, Caledonia's bid for the McCurdy trophy, emblematic of the English rugby championship of Maritime Provinces, fell short at Redland, Saturday, when the Wanderers, winners of the cup last season, met no doubt the score on the Cape Breton visitors.

Caledonia was represented by a light, fast, aggressive fifteen, lacking only pertaining to the fine points of the game, but from whistle to whistle they kept the Reds on the move with a dribbling game as has been shown here in some years.

## U.S. BOARD SELLS 3 SHIPS TO N. Y. MAN

C. P. Stewart, New Owner, Proposes to Operate Vessels in Coastwise Trade

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Sale of the vessels Eastern Mariner, Eastern Light and Eastern Admiral, for the sum of \$175,000 each, to C. P. Stewart, of New York, subject to certain conditions affecting the financial arrangement, was approved by the Shipping Board.

Mr. Stewart proposes that the vessels be operated in the coastwise trade by a new concern, The American Merchant Marine Steamship Corporation, and agrees that they will be converted to approved types of oil burners within 12 months of delivery.

The American Merchant Marine Steamship Corporation is a subsidiary of Frank B. Hall & Co., Inc., an insurance brokerage house of which Mr. Stewart is president. The purchase would be guaranteed by the Hall Co.

The three vessels are of 10,545, 10,705 and 10,585 d. w. t., respectively. They were built by the Asaka Iron Works—two of them in 1920 and one in 1918. Each is equipped with a triple-expansion engine of 2,500 i. h. p. and 3 Scotch boilers, designed to steam about 10.25 knots per hour on 20 tons of coal a day. Mr. Stewart's total offer of \$525,000 for the three ships was submitted following the rejection by the board of an offer of \$440,000.

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## Four ELEVENs CONSIDERED IN RACE FOR CROWN

Navy's Claims Pressed Despite Tie With Army Outfit

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—The climax of a record-shattering football season of thrills and spills, has left a legacy of greater dispute over mythical national championship honors than any campaign in years.

Where Notre Dame's "four horsemen" roamed victoriously far and wide in 1924 and Dartmouth's famous aerial artists decorated the heights without controversy in 1925, the close of the regular 1926 season must at least four outstanding eleven in the title debate. Rebutals from two or three others further complicate the situation.

In spite of its spectacular tie with the Army in Chicago's record-breaking service classic, the Navy still regards itself as very much in the running when title laurels are passed around. Simultaneously, the Army's claims would seem to be on the same level but the cadets tasted one defeat at the hands of Notre Dame, while the Navy up to its final tussle, sank all opposition in nine consecutive games against some of the most powerful outfits of the east or midwest.

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## NAVY HOLDS ARMY TO TIE AT CHICAGO

Strenuous Game Before 110,000 Ends in 21-21—Other Results

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—In a throbbing and sensational struggle as any gridiron has ever seen, the stalwart of the Army and Navy battled into the darkness here yesterday to a 21-21 tie before a throng of 110,000 spectators, the greatest and most colorful outpouring in American football history.

Notre Dame's national football aspirations were shattered at Pittsburgh when the South-Bend Warriors went down to an overwhelming defeat by the rugged Carnegie Tech eleven, 19 to 0.

A crowd of 45,000, a record attendance for any sport event at Forbes' Field, went into ecstasies as the final whistle blew, and tore down the goal posts.
