But Mrs. Mann soon learned a remedy. She could not always remove the cause, but if the youngster came home from school in time she prevented the eye from becoming discolored.

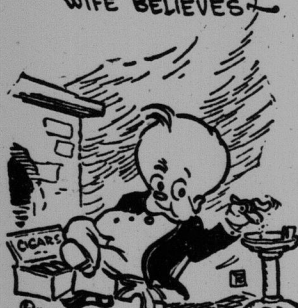

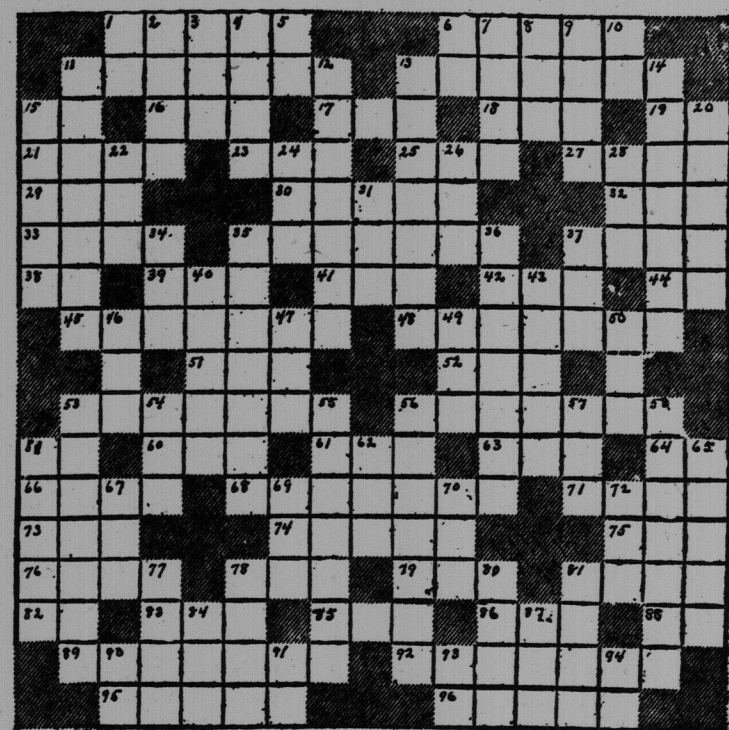
