# CHARTERIS STORY

Will Investigate Tale That German Soldiers Bodies Used For Munitions.

LONDON, Oct. 25—The statement attributed to Brigadier-General J. V. Charteris, war-time chief of the British Intelligence Unit, made in New York this week, that the story that the Germans used bodies of fallen soldiers for making fats for munitions was used as British propaganda, when known to be false, has aroused the authorities in Britain and steps are under way to ascertain if the General has been correctly quoted.

The foregoing refers to a version of General Charteris' recent speech before the National Arts Club in New York which was widely circulated and was published by many papers in the United States. They quoted the General as saying the false report regarding the disposition by the Germans of their dead was started by him and was used by the British Government as war propaganda in order to sway public opinion in China. General Charteris has denied that he implied in his speech that the story was a part of the British propaganda. The version of the General's speech carried by the Canadian Press did not intimate that the story was started, or was used, by the British for propaganda purposes, or that the General has referred to it as propaganda.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—Robert J. Fleming, former Mayor of Toronto, and for many years general manager of the Toronto Street Railway, died here this morning after a brief illness from pneumonia. He was 71 years old.






