Three Tell Denison Police Assistants Were Ku Klux Klan Men.

Denison, Texas, Dec. 6.—Three negroes were flogged by a band of robed and hooded men Tuesday night, it became known when they reported the affair to the police. They were told to buy a warning to negroes here not to mingle with the whites, according to the stories told the police.

One of the alleged victims, seventy-five years old, was seriously hurt. The negroes said the white-robed men told them they were members of the Denison chapter of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.
