LOCAL NEWS

The regular meeting of the ship carpenters and joiners was held in the Odd-fellows' hall, Union street, last evening with 1. Patterson in the chair. There was a good attendance present, and the meeting was occupied with the transaction of routine business.

At a meeting of the executive of the Exhibition Association held in the office of Secretary H. A. Porter in Prince William street yesterday afternoon, arrangements were made with Captain C. H. Stevens, the "Truro" (N.S.) aviator, for a programme of flying stunts during each day of the exhibition.

A break in the East St. John water main, under the Municipal Home bridge, was repaired yesterday morning by workmen from the department of water and sewerage. Another break was discovered near the old fertilizer works in Red Head road and will be repaired this morning, an official of the department said last night.

Commissioner Thornton said last night that the overcrowding of cars must be stopped. He refused to allow one car, crowded to the danger point, to run last night. He is going to Halifax to attend the regatta and while there will make a thorough inspection of the one-man car in use in that city.

The meeting of the W. C. T. U. yesterday was more particularly devoted to its character. The president was in the chair, and having read the second psalm, she spoke very helpfully of the promises and of the conditions under which they were to be fulfilled. Mrs. R. D. Christie was the first to lead in prayer. Arrangements were made for holding the quarterly meeting of the

County Union with the Carleton Union next week. The secretaries were asked to write a letter of sympathy to Mrs. H. W. Robertson, a valued member who has suffered the loss of her mother.

The extension of the water service along the Old Westmorland road from Russell street to Egbert street, was finished yesterday after three weeks' work and an expenditure of almost \$5,000. This new service will obviate the necessity of cutting off the entire water supply of the East St. John district if a break occurs in the Marsh road between the One Mile House and Cooper's Corner and Egbert street, the route on which the East St. John supply formerly depended. The new link provides an additional source of supply via Russell street.

About twenty policemen are taking the course in first aid being given by Dr. F. T. Dunlop. The first class was held last evening. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health, was present and addressed the class briefly before the lecture began. It is intended to hold classes until all the force attain proficiency. Henceforth lectures will be given on Tuesday afternoons from 8.30 to 4.30 o'clock.

The employees of the Wilson Box Company at Fairville and Westfield saw mills and their families were entertained by the company at a picnic yesterday at Crystal Beach. The steamer Premier was chartered for the day. The morning was spent in bathing and outdoor games. After lunch there was a ball game between the St. Rose's baseball team and the box men. Alexander Wilson, managing director of the company, supervised the arrangements personally.

SON TO MRS. MARCUS DALY.
Caesarian Operation Brings Into World Heir of Late Copper Magnate.

A son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Daly yesterday morning at the Radium Sanatorium, 208 West Seventh street. The child is a grandson of the late Marcus Daly, the Montana copper magnate, who left a large fortune.

Mrs. Daly went to the hospital early yesterday, where the rare Caesarian operation was performed by Dr. B. F. Rolter. Last evening it was said at the Sanatorium that the condition of both Mrs. Daly and her son was satisfactory. Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Daly reside at 1,067 Fifth avenue. They were married in March, 1919, at the Church of the Ascension. Mrs. Daly is a sister-in-law by marriage of former Ambassador James W. Gerard. Her maiden name was Lela von Harrenreich and she comes from a noble Austrian family.

Dr. Rolter, who performed the operation, was a famous professional wrestler of this country prior to his retirement four years ago since when he has devoted all his time to the practice of medicine. The Caesarian operation is so called because it is said to have been the means whereby Julius Caesar came into the world.

BRIDEGROOM AT 92.

Lincolnshire, Eng., Aug. 18.—A sensation has been caused in East Lincolnshire by the marriage, in his 92nd year, of the Rev. Canon John Shrapnel Warren to his secretary, Miss Marsh. His first wife died last year.

TWO ACCIDENTS AT ST. STEPHEN

Mrs. Thomas McGrath of St. Stephen was severely injured in an automobile accident yesterday. In the car were a man and two other women. The car went over the side of a bridge into a creek where there was tide water. A feature of the accident was the heroic efforts of Miss Charlotte Clarke, a member of the party, though herself stunned and bleeding, to plunge her hand and arms beneath the water repeatedly and dragged first one and then the other of the women to safety. The victims were taken to the Calais Hospital where it was found that Mrs. McGrath was suffering from severe injuries to her head and spine as well as her chest. Frank Campbell, the driver of the car, was placed in the Calais jail but had to be removed to the Calais Hospital on account of injuries to his head and spine.

St. Stephen was the scene of another accident on Tuesday evening when a car driven by John Norton was coming down Main street when a tire blew out. The car shot down the steep hill, across the sidewalk crowded with pedestrians, and into the drug store of George F. Crawford, carrying away the door and one side of the plate glass front, besides demolishing two silent salesmen. The damage to the store will be \$2,000 and it will take several hundred to repair the car.

THE STREET RAILWAY.

Street railway matters were informally discussed at a meeting yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office. Those present were the mayor, Commissioners Thornton, Frink, Jones and Bullock, L. R. Ross and T. H. McCauley representing the N. B. Power Co. and Fred A. Campbell, Ira D. Farris and Percy Moore representing the men.

The mayor reported that he had examined the type of one-man car in use in Lewis, P. Q., and found it wholly unfit to handle the difficult passages in a city. He said that the type proposed for the type proposed for here had in the demonstrations given not been very satisfactory.

The position of the men is the same as has been previously stated. They refuse to operate the type proposed, but are willing to give the Birney one-man car a trial and if satisfactory will operate cars of this type. In regard to the Birney car, Mr. Ross said the company had no money to buy them.

Mr. McCauley and Mr. Ross said the company would have to maintain the present service, owing to financial conditions, for a time at least.

EXPECT MANY IN HIGH SCHOOL.

It is expected that this will be a record year in the St. John High School, preparations are being made for 700 and in order to accommodate that number forty desks are to be placed in the old Hazen avenue synagogue which was purchased last year by the school board. In spite of this additional space it is expected that some of the rooms in High School will have to take forty or forty-five pupils. There will be three rooms of grade XI or thirty-five each; five of grade X with an average of forty-five pupils and nine rooms of grade IX averaging forty-two to forty-five pupils each.

Doctor Bridges said yesterday that there will be no shortage of teachers in any of the larger centres of the province, but that some of the rural schools might have to be closed on account of the lack of teachers.
