Ottawa, March 6-In a bill introduced Ottawa, March 6—In a bill introduced by Senator Robertson in the senate yesterday to amend the industrial disputes investigation act of 1907, legislation of great importance to employers and organized labor throughout Canada is embodied. If it passes, the minister will be able at his own instance to call for a board or recommend to the cabinet an inquiry, not only after a strike or lockout has occurred, but if one "seems to the minister to be imminent."
