LOCK THE DOOR BEFORE HORSE HAS BEEN STOLEN

Important Labor Bill Introduced in the Senate

Minister of Labor, Under It, Could Call Board or Start Inquiry Into Strike or Lock-Out Without Request, or Even if Trouble Seems Imminent.

Ottawa, March 6—In a bill introduced by Senator Robertson in the senate yesterday to amend the industrial disputes investigation act of 1907, legislation of great importance to employers and organized labor throughout Canada is embodied.

The minister is also asking for an amendment to the technical education act, by which previous provincial expenditures on account of land, buildings or equipment will be taken into consideration in estimating the amount of Dominion grants to various provinces.

TOLD TALE OF DIVISION OF THE STOLEN LIQUOR

Cases of Kentucky Brand Taken at Napadogan

Unnamed Person Doled It Out—The Liquor Had Been Sent Out of States When Prohibition Was Going Into Effect.

Fredericton, N. B., March 6—How a freight car loaded with Kentucky whiskey which had been shipped out of the United States when prohibition as coming into force in that country as broken into about thirty cases, a freight train was being made up at the C. N. R. yards at Napadogan and cases of the liquor were distributed by one unnamed person who got into the car and doled them out to all the employees who cared to go after them, was later in the police court here yesterday afternoon when the preliminary examination of one of ten employees now under arrest here on charge of thefts on the Canadian National Railway was commenced. This one had pleaded guilty.

ARSON AGAIN IS HEAD IN ULSTER

Arrives at Los Angeles. 'Weeping and Worn,' After Divorce

SHUNS REPORTERS AND PHOTOGRAPHERS, HURRIES FROM TRAIN, STUMBLES AND FALLS—MOTHER BERATES INTERVIEWERS AND THE PICTURE MEN.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 6—Mary Pickford, weeping and worn, stumbled from a train here today on her return from Minden, Nevada, where she had obtained a divorce decree on Tuesday from Owen Moore. She waited until all the passengers had left the car, then peered out and, seeing newspaper men and camera men, flanked by a crowd of the curious, she fled to the opposite side of the car. As she ran, with tears streaming down her face, she stumbled and fell. Her mother helped her up, and she fled to a waiting automobile and sped away.

BRITISH IN SKIRMISHES WITH TURKS

Latter Regard War Responsibilities Lightly—Agreement on Turkish Treaty.

Constantinople, March 6—British forces in the Mesopotamian region, particularly near Keruk and Mosul, have been engaged in constant skirmishes with tribesmen and Turkish irregulars, the position of these forces being similar to that encountered by the French at Aintab, Marash and other points in Cilicia.

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GO TO JAIL AND LOSE THEIR GOLD

Sentences in London for the Melting of the Yellow Coin.

London, March 6—Six months imprisonment was the sentence pronounced upon six men who have been on trial here for melting gold and passing it off as gold they had in their possession, amounting to more than 110,000 sovereigns, was ordered yesterday.

ELEVEN DOLLARS FOR BRICKLAYERS IN ST. THOMAS

St. Thomas, Ont., March 6—After a conference between local contractors and their workmen yesterday, the employers granted the bricklayers \$11 for a one-hour day. This is an increase of thirty cents an hour over last year's scale.

CATHOLIC WOMEN WILL FORM NATIONAL COUNCIL

Washington, March 6—Catholic women, representing 8,000 Catholic societies, began a conference here on Thursday looking to the formation of a national Catholic women's council, with headquarters in Washington. The new organization will be formed to afford an instrument for the co-ordination of the activities of all the Catholic women's societies in the United States.

DANISH LEGISLATION TO DEAL WITH EXCHANGE

Copenhagen, March 6—A bill designated to prevent all American imports into Denmark unless sanctioned by the financial council, was introduced today in the Folketing by the minister of commerce. He described the measure as urgently necessary to prevent further decline in exchange.

BANQUET IN HONOR OF CHIEF INSPECTOR IS POSTPONED

Fredericton, March 6—A committee of temperance workers in Fredericton appointed to make the arrangements for a banquet to Kev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector under the prohibition act, has decided that the banquet be postponed until later in the spring.

POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning Albert Ritchie was charged with breaking and entering the store of Abraham Dreskin, Main street, and stealing cloth to the value of \$1,000. No evidence was taken and at the request of the prosecution the accused was remanded.

HEALTH OFFICIALS IN QUEBEC SEIZE BEEF

Quebec, March 6—Inspectors of the city health department made a seizure of 5,975 pounds of beef unfit for consumption in the cold storage plant of the Dominion Fish & Fruit Company. The meat was owned by Quebec dealers.

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
