HOUSE DRAINAGE

A perfect drainage system—(1) must drain perfectly toward its natural outlet, thereby carrying away and discharging into the house sewer all matter received by it; (2) must be perfectly gas-tight and watertight to prevent damage to health or property by leakage; (3), must be properly trapped and ventilated to prevent foul air passing into the building; (4), should be constructed of suitable materials that will not crack or break on sudden changes of temperature; (5), should have joints as strong as the pipes themselves; (6), should be run straight and true, with a uniform fall, and should be securely fastened to prevent settling or swinging, and so supported as to prevent severe stresses on the connections; (7), must be large enough in all its parts to easily carry off all drainage, but not so large as not to be self-cleaning.

New Proposals For Irish Government

London, Feb. 14.—Dramatic developments are impending in the situation in Ireland. The Daily Express is given to understand that Lord French, viceroy of Ireland, has come to London to place before Prime Minister Lloyd George tentative proposals for a radical change in the existing system of Irish government. These proposals are supported by Ian Macpherson, the new chief secretary for Ireland, and have been approved by the section of Unionists.

The striking feature of the scheme is that it deals with Ireland as a whole, the "clean cut" of the Ulster counties is absent from Lord French's plan which, however, makes an effort to meet the desires of the Ulster Unionists. Thus

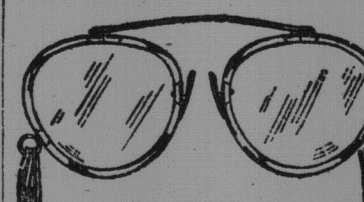

"Can You Tame Wild Wimmen?" Billy Murray

"The Worst is Yet to Come" is a cheerful ditty which everybody will enjoy, except his ex-majesty, William Hohenzollern. It is that amazing blend of gay humor and grim earnest which is so typically American, and so incomprehensible to minds of the Junker mould. Hits along to a jaunty rhythm, breaking toward the end into the melody of "Glory Hallelujah" with different words. In short, the song writers, Sam M. Lewis, Joe Young and Bert Gran have provided Billy Murray with the kind of song that is meat and drink to him. Nor is he he happily fixed in "Can You Tame Wild Wimmen?" by Andrew B. Sterling and Harry Von Tilze. It is the story of Jay Augustus Henpeck Brown, who went to the circus and watched the lion tamer do his stunt, and figured that a man who could "make a mule stand on his head" might do something to tame his wife!
