**Minors to Increase Prices.**

Chicago, Feb. 18.—Club owners of the American Association undoubtedly will follow the example of the major leagues in increasing the prices of admission, President Hickey says. The question will be decided at the schedule meeting to be held in Milwaukee on Feb. 28.

"It will be necessary to take some action to avoid handling pennies in meetings," Hickey said. "It will be impossible to serve the public in making odd-penny change. I think the majority of the club owners will vote in favor of increasing the prices."

**Braves To Get Henry.**

New York, Feb. 18.—It is semi-officially announced here that the American League clubs will waive claims on Catcher John Henry of the Washington Americans and that he will go to the Boston Club of the National League.

**Robertson Refuses to Sign.**

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 18.—David Robertson, outfielder of the New York Nationals, has returned his contract unaltered to Manager McGraw, because of a disagreement as to salary. Robertson accepted a position today as Athletic Director at the Norfolk High School and baseball.

**Yanks in New York April 24.**

The Yankees will open the season to Washington, after which they will play a series in Boston. Miller Huggins will make his debut as an American League manager at the Polo Grounds, New York, when the Yankees open their season with Washington on April 24. The season opens in the west on April 16, and the Eastern season starts one day previous.

**The Yankees have two holiday games at home and two holiday dates.** Decoration Day and Labor Day. The Athletics will play two games here on May 20, and the Boston Red Sox will be the opponents of the Yanks on Sept. 2 in two games. The Yanks will also have two holiday games in Boston on April 19, Bunker Hill Day, and on July 4, Huggins' team will play in Washington. They have eight Sunday dates in the west.

**In the schedule are three conflicting dates with the National League, all of them coming in Chicago, June 26, Aug. 21, and Sept. 1. Cleveland will play the White Sox on these conflicting dates. Cleveland has the greatest number of Sunday games, fourteen. The season of 184 games will close on Oct. 5.**

**WRESTLING.**

New York, Feb. 18.—Wladek Zbyszko, who is matched to oppose Joe Stecher of Nebraska in a wrestling bout at Madison Square Garden on March 1 has arrived here from the West. Zbyszko will shortly take up hard training for his match with the Nebraska scissor-pull expert.
