PROPERTY IN NORTH SECTION

Renewed Interest in Real Estate There

NEW TUG NEARLY READY

Other Work on Hilyard's Blocks—Millidgeville Road and The Street Railway—The River Steamers—A General Sir

An upward movement in real estate in North End has, during the last few weeks, become more particularly noticeable. Founded upon actual conditions in some sections, it is said, to be quite standard and not in the nature of a "bubble." The upper end of Chesley street, along Douglas avenue, and along the Millidgeville road with the heads of the streets included, are about the districts embraced most largely in the upward trend, and there are various reasons assigned for this.

As regards Chesley street the fact that arrangements are practically completed for the construction of the new government bridge at the falls, and that, if material can be secured, work will be started about May 1, together with the talk of the C. P. E. erecting a new railway bridge has caused a firmness in the price of holdings about that section. People along Chesley street are also hopeful that before very long the street cars will be running along that street.

Recent deals in real estate towards the outer end of Douglas avenue have shown that prices were on the rise in that vicinity and there is activity in building operations in that neighborhood. About fifty men are employed at present in the work being done by the New Brunswick Realty Co. in the avenue, in leveling off and grading its properties, on which it is proposed to build several fine dwelling houses facing the avenue. Although there has been little buying about the head of Chesley street, it is declared a fact that recent sales have been made and rejected by some holders because of being considered too low when future prospects were taken into mind.

The reason for the rising trend in the price of holdings along the Millidgeville road, is that the promises made by the new millidgeville railway company are being met, and when it is said that they will extend their tracks out to the pretty little harbor which lies at the end of the road, it is believed that before a very lengthy period, the dream of the early residents that the road would be realized, and what has been for years a waste will turn into reality. Some years ago there was taken a survey of a possible route for the connection of Millidgeville, but nothing came of it, and when, after years of waiting, it is at last learned that something definite is to be done, it is only an expected result that property values should experience an upward impulse.

For the last few years building has been going quietly but steadily along the Millidgeville road, until what only a few months ago was a sterile field and waste land, is now the site of several fine residences. There has been much building activity on both sides of the road, and it has gradually been extending outward towards Millidgeville.

Also at Millidgeville itself, during the last year or two, several fine cottages have been built by city people and residents taken there during the summer months, and it is the belief of many that with a car line running to the little harbor, which is famed for its prettiness in the season of "Happy Days," several other citizens will erect new summer homes in that neighborhood.

What is greatly desired is a new ferry steamer, and residents of the city, North End, Millidgeville, and the Kennebecasis, would like to see a larger one on the route. It was planned some time ago to have a conference with Premier Fleming upon the subject to see what arrangements could be made for a new steamer or the purchase of another, but so far no meeting has been held. There is no hope expressed that any improvement can be made this year.

The members of the staffs of the dealers engaged in the various saw-mills about the city are planning upon the formation of a union falling in line with other branches of industry. A meeting was held this week and the subject was discussed and steps taken for procuring a charter, and the furtherance of organization, and it is expected that at another meeting next week more will sign the charter roll.

It would look to the spectator about the wharves in the vicinity of Hilyard's mill during the last few months that the age of ship-building in the city was being revived, for there was more than usual activity on the blocks there. Most of the work which has been going on all winter is about finished, and the result is that within a few days there will be launched a fine new tugboat for G. S. Mayes and a new government section dredge, while work is progressing favorably upon the fitting up of a scow, with what is practically a machine shop in itself on top of it.

The machinery for the new tugboat being built by Mr. Mayes will be taken from the tug "Dirigo" and placed in the form of a conveyor being built for the Dominion Coal Co. to facilitate their work in loading and unloading their cargoes. It is something new about St. John harbor, but has given excellent results elsewhere. The supervising of its construction is being done by W. J. Barton.

The new section dredge being built for the department has already been described in the Times. Work upon it is fast drawing to a close, and it has been a very large contract. It has been built under direction of F. S. Hens with the machinery being installed by James Fleming's

Each day sees the water at Indian town steadily lowering, and the general impression is that the height of the freshet has been reached, although there is a possibility that the water may again come up. A few days ago the water in the harbor at Indian town was about level with the tops of some of the wharves, but did not come over even at the highest tide, and though reports were received from the up-country sections that the water was overflowing the banks, there was no indication that it would come much higher about Indian town. Now it has fallen again, and with much of the snow and ice gone from the woods and up river districts there is not expected to be much more rise.
