JUSTIFIED, SAYS ISMAY

Upholds High Speeding of Titanic in Ice Region—British Inquiry Resumed

LONDON, June 4.—J. Bruce Ismay told the British court of inquiry today that it had been planned to drive the Titanic at full speed during a few favorable hours of her maiden trip, and that he considered Captain Smith fully justified in going full speed through the ice region, so long as weather conditions made it possible to see ice ahead.

Lord Mersey repeated the question which Captain Smith had handed him, on June 1, in his action, adding, "At either day or night?" Ismay replied in the affirmative. Ismay told the court that the chief engineer had arranged before the steamer left Queenstown for New York that the weather being favorable on either Monday or Tuesday, the vessel would be driven at full speed for a few hours. For delay, Ismay insisted that he had nothing to do with the navigation of the ship.

WILL OF JAMES P. HARRIS

The will of James Peter Harris, deceased, was proved in the probate court today. He gives all his property to Arthur Mackenzie, of St. John, insurance agent, and nominates him as executor. He directs that he shall pay out of the income of the estate to his wife Margaret \$500 a year which by a codicil to his will he increases to \$1000 a year. Since the death of the testator the widow died on May 18. The will gives an annuity of \$100 to the deceased's sister Caroline, wife of Charles W. Hubbard of Boston, retired policeman, such annuity to begin on the death of her husband. On the death of his wife he directs that the sum of \$800 be paid to the corporation of St. Paul's church, St. John, and on the death of his wife and of his sister Caroline Hubbard, and on the entering of age of each of his sons George E. and Albert J. Harris, then to divide the rest among the surviving grandchildren who shall have attained such age, but no payment or division to be made until the youngest grandchild comes of age. In the event of all the grandchildren who are now seven in number, the youngest of whom is two years old, dying without attaining such age he gives all his property one-half to the corporation of St. Paul's church and the remaining half to the St. John Protestant Orphan Asylum. Mr. Robinson was sworn in as executor. Real estate is \$4,500; personal estate, \$7,500. Clarence H. Ferguson is probator.

ORCHARD SURVEYS

Under the direction of A. G. Turvey, provincial horticulturist, orchard surveys of various sections of the country are being commenced today. One man is starting in Charlotte and another is working the west bank of the St. John river between Fredericton and Woodstock.

When the latter district is completed start will be made on the opposite side of the river working southward. Later the district between Ormococt and Westman will be gone over. In about a month an expert will visit Albert and Westman counties. The experts visit each farm in their district taking notes of the number of apple trees set out, the amount of land suitable for orchards, the varieties planted and those which produce best, insect pests and other valuable information. This is filed for the benefit of those looking for openings in fruit raising. Farmers are also given expert advice on the treatment of their orchards.

Mr. Turvey will start in a week or two to locate the experimental orchards for the Board of Trade of St. John, Moncton and Woodstock. He will leave this evening for Sherbrooke where he is to address a meeting in connection with the visit of the better farming special.

Halifax, N. S., June 4.—(Special)—W. H. Chase, of Wolfville, has offered to give ten per cent. of the amount collected in Halifax for the Dalhousie University fund, up to \$25,000.
