### QUEEN ALEXANDRA, SAYS REPORT, WILL NOT BE AT CORONATION

#### Rumor Says, also, There Will Be Two Social Courts in England

London, Feb. 3.—England was disappointed today by the announcement that Dowager Queen Alexandra, widow of King Edward, would not attend the coronation. Various rumors are current as to why Her Majesty has come to this decision, one being that Queen Mary and the Dowager Queen are rivals for social supremacy.

### NEW WONDERS OF WORLD OF SPACE ARE REVEALED

#### Powerful Mirror of Great Telescope, Across Billions of Miles, Shows Universes in the Making

(Special to Times)

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 3.—Reaching across billions of miles of space, the powerful reflecting mirror of the Mount Wilson sixty-inch telescope has revealed universes in the making. It has found and photographed a chaotic swirling mass of gas and fiery liquids, a gigantic whirl of celestial protoplasm five hundred billion miles in diameter in the act of throwing off a world.

The photograph portrays a spiral nebula. It apparently contains the nebular by-products of the French astronomer Leavitt's place and it does substantiate the more recent nebular hypothesis of Professor Chamberlain of Chicago University.

"The Rainbow is today in Esquimaut harbor, and has had no accident of any kind that would give rise to such a report. We are at a loss to know how it originated."

### ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE

The case of the King vs John Woodrow came up for hearing before Judge Robie this morning, the defendant electing to be tried under the "Speedy Trial Act." The prisoner claimed to have no recollection of doing what he was charged with. His Honor found the defendant guilty but allowed him to go under suspended sentence, the prisoner taking the pledge for one year. C. H. Ferguson appeared for the prosecution.

Referring to this case, Mr. Aide informs the Times that, while in his place, Woodrow showed no signs of intoxication, but moved with great agility and when seen outside a little later, Woodrow was able to run like a deer. Mr. Aide therefore contends that the man's assertion that he had no recollection of what he was doing is ridiculous.
