The eclipse moves with the speed of artillery fire, the rate of travel being about 1,830 miles an hour, or a halfmile a second. It was partial from Greenland to the Amazon River, and it passed over the most densely populated area of any total eclipse in the history of the world. For the small der of the twentieth century only four total eclipses of the sun are scheduled to take place in the central part of North America, these being in the years of 1945, 1979, 1984 and 1994.
