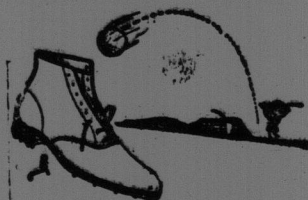

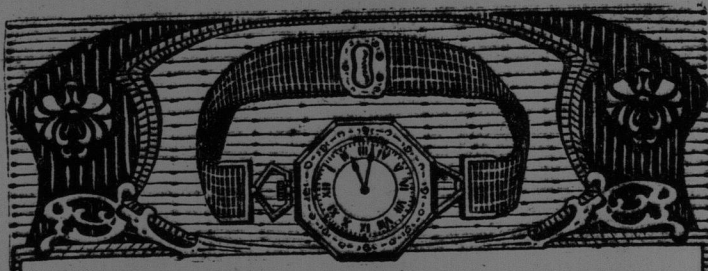

RECENT DEATHS

Word was received yesterday by Adjutant Gilbert Best, commander of the local division of the Salvation Army, of the death on Thursday night, of his father, George Best, one of the prominent lumber merchants of St. John's, Newfoundland.

The death of John Tennant occurred yesterday at Fredericton at the advanced age of eighty-seven years. The late Mr. Tennant was a shipbuilder in the days of the wooden ship, and he will be remembered in shipping circles by men of the older generation as the builder of many of the sturdiest vessels that ever left this port. Mr. Tennant was of Scottish descent and possessed in a large

degree the fine quality of the Scottish race. He is survived by five sons and two daughters. The sons are George E. of Vancouver; Ernest E., of Winnipeg; Walter H., of Amherst; Fred M., of Moncton; and William B., and Robert, of St. John's. The daughters are Miss Maud M., of New York, and Mrs. Richard Hocken, of Barrington, N. S.

A telegram received by Joseph Irvine, 45 High street, contained the news that his brother, Herbert T. Irvine, had died in Mexico City after an operation. Mr. Irvine left St. John about twenty years ago for British Columbia, and entered the drygoods business with his brothers at Nelson (B. C.). Retiring from the drygoods trade, a few years ago, he engaged in the real estate business and opened offices at Spokane (Wash.). He left the latter city for Mexico on business and while there succumbed. He is survived by his wife and two children, at present in New York, also by three brothers and one sister: Joseph, of this city; Frederick and William, Nelson (B. C.); and Mrs. E. R. Atherton, Victoria (B. C.).

Edwin T. S. Clark died at his home, Dipper Harbor, on May 20, at the age of seventy-eight years. He served in the war of secession and was wounded. He was twice married; his second wife, formerly Miss Lily Sweet of Fairville, survives. He leaves five sons and three daughters, including Mrs. Harry Carr of Fairville.

Many friends throughout the Maritime Provinces will learn with regret of the death of John A. Edwards which took place in Halifax yesterday afternoon about 6 o'clock. He was widely known in these provinces and was a native of Fredericton where he was for many years the proprietor of the Queen hotel and afterwards became the post master of that city. For the last few years he had been a resident of Halifax, where he was engaged in business with

his brother, R. H. Edwards. He is survived by his widow; one sister, Mrs. George W. Hodge of Fredericton; two brothers, R. H. Edwards of Halifax and M. B. Edwards of St. John. Two sons, William F., of Fredericton and Jack, in the West and one daughter Mrs. Dawes Gilmour. Arrangements for the funeral will be announced later.

The death of Mrs. Nelson Russell occurred at her home in Maine recently. Mrs. Russell was a native of St. John and was sixty years of age. The last three years of her life had been passed in Houlton. She is survived by her husband, an adopted daughter, Mrs. Charles McDougall, of Lawrence (Mass.), and one sister, Miss Elizabeth Thompson. The funeral services were held Wednesday in Kirland (N. B.).

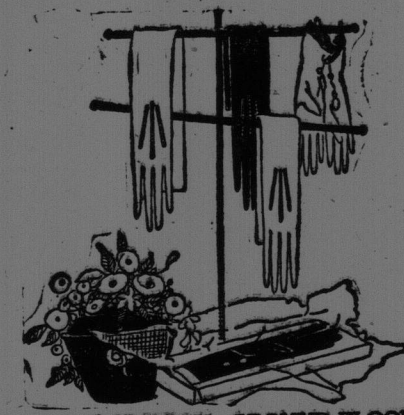
