## Making Cod Liver Oil

### For the Guidance of ...anufacturers

1st. The manager in charge of factory must see that the livers O New Year, teach us faith! are fresh; that all brown or poor livers are thrown out; that there Is no gall bladder attached to any livers.

2nd. The good livers must then be washed in a tub of clean

3rd. The pan in which the livers are boiled must be perfectly clean inside, before any livers are placed in it. 4th. Before you start to boil any livers, you must have suffi

cient steam. 5th. Turn on the steam, and use as much as you need to have

tor the quantity of livers you have in your pan. Boil until the white scum floats off (which will take about thirty minutes.) Don't forget ostir the livers, and see that those in the bottom and those around the sides are brought into direct contact with the steam all the time. 6th. Turn the steam off, and allow all to settle, not exceeding

five minutes, according to capacity of liver boiler. 7th. Then you dip all the oil you can get, which is the finest white oil. Put this oil in a cooling tank made of galvanized iron, and let the oil remain there till next morning. 9th. Then clean your liver pan with warm water and washing Friend, come thou like a friend, powder. Have it bright and clean for the next boiling.

10th. Every bag, cloth, tank, funnel and pan, must bewashed only with warm water, soap and water. Seda must not be used. The best results for medical oil can only be obtained by the use of tin barrels. Wooden packages generally make the oil dark, and lestroy its fine flavor. Keep all oil in barrels in a cool place, and overed from the sun.

## REGULATIONS For Salting Scotch Pack Herring

One barrel salt to five and a half barrels herring-Large Fulld One barrel salt to six barrels berring-Medium Fulls. One barrel salt to six and a half barrels herring-Matt Fulls.

This amount of salt is for dredging and laying on rows only. I loes not take into account that put on the herring before gibbing. All salt falling off herring in rousing tubs is put on rows as you make, unless very dirty or scaly; in that case, you have to make
