If Canada should cease to be a part of the empire tomorrow the out-lay on the British army and navy would not be one farthing less than it is today."

To this the Ottawa Journal replies: "A grown-up man who though able to earn his Hving and actually mak-ing money sponges on his relatives for free lodging or free privileges of any kind is not considered a nice kind of a man, even though the relative he may sponge on at any time does not appear to be put to extra expense. Such a relative having a house and household to maintain, need not and does not make his house any bigger to lodge the human leech, any more than Britain may appear to enlarge her navy or consular service to protect or benefit Canada. But the leech is none the less contemptible on that account. "What Canada takes as a matter of business she should pay for like any honest and self-respecting person. "As the Journal has occasionally re-marked, two attitudes are respectable on this Imperial question among Can-adians. One, if we wish the Dominion to be part of the Britsh empire, is to pay a share of the Imperial expense -rather call it the imperial insurance. If we object to pay, the other respect-able attitude is to advocate Canadian independence—a separate national ex-istence, disavowing the empire—and, if we think necessary, set up such a mili-tary, naval, diplomatic and consultar service as other states of our political class. 
