### FREDERICTON NEWS.

FREDERICTON, March 18.—The old deaf and dumb property on Forrest Hill was sold yesterday. J. H. Barry, K. C., is the purchaser at 1405.  
A reward of \$20 is being offered by the Surveyor General Dunn for information leading to the discovery and conviction of the persons who killed a bull moose at Peniac, Feb. 28. A reward is also being offered for information leading to the conviction of persons violating the game law.  
George Robertson, D. J. Purdy and Edward Lantam waited upon the government yesterday and very strongly urged that \$5,000 be granted to the St. John Exhibition Association. The

St. John members spoke at length in support of their request and were most earnest in their efforts to secure this important aid.

### OTTAWA NEWS

OTTAWA, March 17.—This was private members' day, and the house only held a short session, to enable representatives who so desired to listen to B. Cochrane, the celebrated New York Irish orator, tonight.  
Sir Frederick Borden introduced the new militia act, which he explained made radical departures from the old measure, which it was intended to supplant. The bill throws open the position of general officer commanding to all qualified British officers, whether imperial or colonial, and abolishes the rule that British officers engaged in Canada shall take precedence of Canadian officers of the same rank, irrespective of the date of commission.  
The permanent force is to be increased from one thousand to two thousand men, who will be paid on the basis of the mounted police schedule.  
The pay of active militia is also to be raised. To give aid to the civil power on occasion of riots, the active militia shall only be called on when the permanent force is not available, or is not equal to the task. Power is taken to extend the period of annual drill from 15 to 30 days, to enroll and drill cadet companies, and to create temporary brigadier generals.  
The minister said that when the bill comes on for second reading he would fully explain its clause by clause.

### SPORTING NEWS.

**HOCKEY.**  
Indians Lost Another Sculp.  
SUSSEX, N. B., March 17.—The game between the Beesmoaks, the Canadian Indian team from Fredericton, and the Sussex team tonight, was fast and exciting from the beginning. At the end of the first half the score was 2 to 1 in favor of the home team. During the second half, Sussex again scored 3 and the visitors 2, making the final score 5 to 4 in favor of the home team.

### THE TERCENTENARY.

Programme for Celebration April Under Discussion.  
An important meeting of the tercentenary committee was held last night in the Neptune Rowing Club rooms, when many suggestions with regard to the big Champlain celebration were made and considered.  
The meeting was the last one that will be held in the Rowing Club's rooms and hereafter the mayor's office will be used.

After considerable discussion it was decided to have a medal struck in commemoration of the tercentenary, to be given to the committee consisting of Col. Markham, G. A. Esey, Mayor White and Dr. Dole was appointed to look after the matter.  
Copies of the letters sent to Ottawa re the proposed military display were read. The officials at Ottawa ask for more particulars and intimated that the civil authorities would be required to guarantee expenses of transportation, etc.

On motion of Col. Markham, seconded by Mr. Harvey, a programme committee was appointed as follows:—Mayor White, chairman; Alderman Bullock, Colonel Sturges, Alderman Lewis, Rev. W. O. Raymond, George Jenkins, D. C. Clench, Hon. R. J. Ritchie, president of the League, and Labor Council, Richard O'Brien, Colonel Markham, Roland Frith, of the Neptune Rowing Club, and William White, representing the Royal Kennebec Yacht Club.

### MORE LIQUOR LICENSES.

The twenty-fifth of this month is the last day on which applications for liquor licenses can be filed. It does not seem, however, that there will be any falling off in the number of applicants for licenses, as already more than half of the applications have been sent in. Inspector Jones is afraid that the applications may exceed the legalized number, in which case there will have to be many refusals.  
Some saloon keepers intend removing their premises. T. L. Burke, for instance, who has been carrying on the business of the late Edw. Burke, has leased the Pinesy building on Dock street with the intention of taking out a wholesale license. Wm. J. Nugent, who now has a saloon on Union street, will also probably remove to Dock street and take possession of the premises at present occupied by the McLaughlin Carriage Co. Some merchants on Dock street are protesting against these additions to the saloons already in that locality.

### MURRAY STREET MISSION.
