LOCAL NEWS

Rev. Gordon Dickie occupied the pulpit of the Presbyterian Church at Hampton yesterday morning and at Salina in the afternoon.

A number of North End young ladies are planning to hold a rummage sale in the Every Day Club rooms on October 21st and 22nd. The proceeds will go towards the fund for maintaining the Riverside Memorial Park.

Between Saturday night and Sunday noon Frank Rafferty's house on Marsh Head was entered. A ring valued at \$12 and \$20 in cash were taken from the premises. The stolen articles were in their places Saturday night and after dinner yesterday were missed by one of the occupants. The police were notified and suspicion rests on a hired man around the place who was absent from his accustomed place yesterday afternoon. As yet no arrests have been made.

After spending four weeks in Western Canada and the Pacific Coast, E. J. Purdy returned home Saturday evening much improved in health. He saw many former St. John people during his trip and visited the Pacific fair at Seattle. Mr. Purdy considered Vancouver the most prosperous city visited during his whole trip. He was also impressed with the lumber and fish industries of Canada's Pacific province and saw \$5,000 salmon being taken at a single catch.

W. T. James, a passenger from Bermuda to his old home at Paradise, N. S., reached the city yesterday morning on the S.S. Sobos. He states that trade conditions between the island and Canada were in a better condition than ever before. Everything is booming on the island itself and indications point to good crops in onions and other commodities. Lord Kitchener is expected to visit the island during the winter, as the guest of General Walker Kitchener.

Mr. Maxwell K. Moorehead, U. S. consul at this port, has received official intimation of the appointment of Mr. Lawrence H. Hood, of West Virginia, to the position of vice-consul here, made vacant by the removal of Mr. Fletcher to Toledo, Ohio. Mr. Hood was formerly connected with the consular service at Parrboro, N. S., and lately was stationed at Halifax, N. S., where he will arrive here in a day or two.

While standing on the wharf at Reed's Point on Saturday afternoon watching the boat races in the harbor, Mrs. Grant of this city, who was seated on an enthusiastic spectator, had the misfortune to drop her hand satchel containing a sum of money, gold watch, gold bracelet and diamond ring, into the harbor. Nothing could be done at the time to recover the lost articles, but Mrs. Grant has secured the services of Diver Edward Leahy, who will go down today in an attempt to recover the satchel.

While dispersing a crowd of boys on Union street last night, Policeman Rankins was struck in the leg with a stone thrown by one of the boys. The injury forced him to leave his beat and seek his home. The officer was chasing the crowd when he was struck by a stone thrown from behind. He sought aid at a nearby drug store, but was suffering such intense pain that he was forced to take a car for his home. This is the second case in a short time when the police have been interfered with by unruly boys and as several of last night's crowd are known, arrests will probably be made.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 19.—With the arrival in Des Moines at 6.45 tomorrow morning of President Taft, the largest army tournament in the history of the country will open in this city. Fully 5,500 soldiers will take part in the manoeuvres and tournament.

GRANT TO FACE CHARGE OF ILLEGAL SHOOTING

His Moose Was Under Age—Caught With the Goods—Warden Dean Reports Lots of Big Game in Sight.

THE FIRST WOMAN TO GET A MOOSE THIS YEAR

Mrs. S. Mason, of Canterbury Station, Shot a Fine Animal at Kiburra Lake on Saturday.

Mrs. Sherman Mason of Canterbury Station has the distinction of being the first lady to shoot a moose since the opening of the 1909 season. At Kiburra Lake on Saturday, Mrs. Mason had the good fortune to land a handsome moose. The animal was a large one. It had a spread of fifty-one inches and was in company with four others, when shot. Huntsmen, who frequent the woods are well acquainted with Mrs. Mason, who is a licensed guide.

Reports that big game is very plentiful in that section, which though easy to reach and one of the best moose hunting grounds in the province is not much visited by sportsmen.

The demand for licenses continues steadily and large numbers are being issued. Numerous sportsmen expect to leave for the woods during the week.

A hoboes' camp, which is constantly occupied, now one of the sights at MacAdam Junction, but it is one which is no feast to the eyes of the C. P. R. officials who are doing their best to erase this picturesque feature from the landscape.

One of the gang which infests the C. P. R.'s was captured on Saturday in rather dramatic style. "Caught with the goods on him" was no idle expression as the tramp was found with a large quantity of stolen goods in his possession.

Between Vanceboro and MacAdam, one of the tramps applied the tramp in a box car which had been opened for inspection by the United States Immigration officials. He has opened a packing box containing shoes, and sat by the side of the box with his feet in a nobbly cut pair, which consisted hardly with the remainder of his costume.

When the train reached MacAdam the hobo was divested of his money and was placed under lock and key.

He caused both the railroad and the consignees of the goods some trouble, for the car had to be taken from the train and held at MacAdam pending investigation.

Tramps have been causing the C. P. R. trouble on this and the northern division to an unusual degree. Hundreds of them have been getting into the railway for trips to the Acrostok potato fields. The company has some consolation in the thought that they will be paying passengers bailed when the potato digging is through. For some time past the railroad has been at a great deal of trouble and expense in attempting to stamp the hoboes out, and it is now thought that their efforts are meeting with some success.

It is said that the train crews have become terrorized by the numbers in which the tramps travel, and they dare do little to prevent them riding the roads.

It may be a surprise to some to learn that when Detective Killen looked into the hobo camp a few days ago when at MacAdam on the Pass case, he found that out of fifteen men in the gang twelve were from St. John.
