Wait Until Empire's War Ends in Victory Before Asking Self-Government

Moslem League of India Unanimously VotesResolution of Loyalty to Crown and Appreciation of Administration of Baron Hardinge.

London, Jan. 2.—Reuter's correspondent at Bombay, who reported yesterday that the Moslem League of India had suspended its sessions after noisy demonstrations, telegraphs today that the league made strong demands at its last meeting for the self-government of India, un-der the British flag. It was held, however, that it was not imperative to make this change until after the war, when the whole form of govern-ment of the empire should be re-constructed. Resolutions were adopted unanimously expressing loyalty to the Crown, and appreciation of the ad-ministration of Baron Hardinge, viceroy of India.


