NEW TAXES ON ROY EDWARDS

THE THEATRES IS PROMOTED

New Schedule Adopted at Yesterday's Meeting of the City Council—Based on Seating Capacity.

At yesterday's meeting of the common council in committee Commissioner Fisher's motion that the committee recommend a bond issue of \$15,000 for the building of a retaining wall on Main street failed to find a second. He also announced that he would withdraw his motion to rescind the agreement with the Street Railway. It was decided to adopt a new scale of taxes on moving picture theatres. On his recommendation to build a new retaining wall Commissioner Fisher called in the road engineer who stated that the present wall could be braced and made to do for a time yet, although it would have to be rebuilt later.

Commissioner Fisher, however, recommended that the work be undertaken this year. He only had \$1,000 in the appropriation so that a bond issue would be wanted.

Commissioner McLellan suggested that Commissioner Fisher, after what the road engineer had said, would prefer to do temporary repairs. Commissioner Fisher—No. I still think it should be carried out. I do not think it is wise to take the risk of what might happen.

Mayor Hayes then brought up the suggestion to tax the picture and other theatres in the city at the rate of 30 cents a seat up to the first thousand seats, and then fifteen cents per annum in excess of that number. The new schedule would thus be: Star \$120; Palace, \$57; Empress, \$120; Gem, \$240; Lyric, \$235; Unique, \$195; Opera House, \$330; Grand, \$425; a total revenue to the city of \$1,717.50, as against \$1,400. There would be two cases of small decreases, but the Mayor suggested that for the present year the \$200 increase for dramatic purposes could be waived at least for this year. The schedule was adopted.

Commissioner McLellan pointed out that there were small safety regulations that would have to be carried out in some of the theatres.

A bill for \$450 for repairs carried out to No. 6 fire station, West Side, the only tender received, to Mr. J. M. Belyea, of Commissioner McLellan. He said that the insurance assessor put the damage at \$650, but the department were satisfied that the work done covered the case.

OBITUARY.

The death of Robert L. Bridges occurred Wednesday morning at his residence, King street, West St. John, after a lingering illness. He was in the fortieth year of his age and was in the employ of the water works department of the city. He leaves his wife and five small children, the oldest being only eight years old.

Funeral on Saturday morning at 8.45 o'clock to St. Peter's Church for solemn high mass and requiem at 9. Frederickton, June 8—After a few weeks' illness of blood poisoning, resulting from having scratched his hand, Conductor James M. Lewis, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, died at the Victoria Hospital, this morning, aged 50 years. He was one of the best known and most popular officials on this division and had for some time been in charge of one of the Gibson Branch trains. His wife predeceased him several years. Two daughters, Mrs. Edward Cowan and Miss Isabelle Lewis, a school teacher of Woodstock, and one son, who is with the Canadian Artillery at the front, survive. The remains were conveyed to Woodstock this morning and the funeral will take place there tomorrow afternoon.
