Export Clubs

The work of organizing and doing active work in connection with the local export clubs that have been established has progressed a good deal and the members of the staff of the Commercial Intelligence Department of the Division and the Canadian business directly under the control of the C. M. A. have been organized in Toronto and Montreal, and an outline of organization followed in all provinces. One permanent club was established with headquarters in Brandon, which meets at Brantford, London, Stratford and Windsor alternately. Negotiations are now under way looking to the establishment of an active basis of local clubs in British Columbia and the Yukon Provinces. The Divisional Secretaries have been appointed and in getting the clubs established, realizing that they offer a further opportunity for service to members. The objects of the club have been to promote a better understanding of the world, which will influence the development of our export trade and to emphasize the spirit of mutual assistance on the part of the members. The Canadian National Export Club has been the means by which the local clubs have been connected with the Association and to individual members doing or seeking to do business with the West Indies, and the full report obtained has been made possible through the continued and enthusiastic support of Mr. C. H. Parry, Department of External Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, and Mr. Graham F. Towers, Royal Bank of Canada, Montreal, who accompanied the delegation.

WARD TO GO ON TRIAL JULY 17

White Plains, N.Y., June 20.—Walter S. Ward, wealthy baker's son, probably will go on trial for the murder of Clarence Peters, ex-actor, on July 17. It was learned from a reliable source late today.

The information coming close on the heels of a statement held by Isaac N. Mills, former attorney for justice, and the newest accusation to Ward's legal talents, gave rise to reports that an agreement had been reached whereby District Attorney Weeks would ask an early trial and that, provided George S. Ward, the lawyer, would return from his tour of the world, would give the deputy sheriffs a chance to serve him a grand jury subpoena since he had been carrying around for nearly two weeks. DEPUTATION WAITS ON LLOYD GEORGE

London, June 21—Canadian Press—Premier Lloyd George received one of the largest delegations yesterday at Number 10 Downing street when he even attended at the Prime Minister's residence, a committee of persons, including some sixty members of the House of Commons, had appealed on behalf of the Board of Guardians which are in grave financial straits owing to the heavy calls for unemployment relief. The Premier, while expressing sympathy with those who could not ask the House of Commons to sanction an increase for the Board of Guardians for unemployment relief based on local taxation. The only remedy he could see for the present, unfortunate condition was a revival of the export trade.



SEEK NEW MARKETS FOR CANADIAN COAL

Deputy Minister of Mines Going to England in This Connection.

Ottawa, June 21.—Announcement of vigorous and sustained policy of encouragement for the mining industry in Canada was made tonight by the Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, and of Mines. A determined effort will be made to open up new markets for Canadian mineral products. Dr. C. C. Campbell, deputy to the Minister, is leaving at once for England and Ireland in connection with the enactment of high tariff legislation in the United States, tending to restrict the market for Canadian minerals in that country, it is considered of great importance to the industry that new markets be developed.

Court Discusses Charge Against Sir H. Montagu Allan

Montreal, June 21—Judge Cussen, in the Quebec Court, here today, dismissed the complaint against Sir H. Montagu Allan, which charged, on behalf of the Minister of Finances, that he had been guilty of negligently signing a false return to the Government of the affairs of the Merchants' Bank of Canada for the month of October. Sir H. Montagu was president of the Merchants' Bank up to the time of its amalgamation with the Bank of Montreal.

The inquiry, which came to an abrupt end after counsel for prosecution addressed the court urging that there should be a commitment in the matter to the Minister of Justice, the Attorney-General, the Minister of Finance and the Province of Quebec, and the Grand Jury of the present term of King's Bench had practically reversed the judgment which had been delivered in the almost similar case against D. C. Macleod, former general manager of the same bank.


He Lordships did not concur with this view, and when counsel stated that he had decided to prosecute argument, Judge Cussen promptly dismissed the complaint.

The principal feature of the evidence heard today was the point of view of H. H. MacKenzie, who had been called in by Sir H. Allan to report on the conduct of the transaction to the effect that Sir Montagu had no chance to examine the October charge, which is the subject of the charge.

London, June 21.—The Government was defeated in the House of Commons today when Lord Illingworth's motion condemning the Palestine mandate was adopted by a vote of thirty to twenty-nine, although the Earl of Balsall, Acting Foreign Minister, made a strong speech defending the Government's policy and the mandate.
