Export Clubs.
The work of organizing and doing active work in connection with the export clubs that have been formed has engendered a good deal of the members of the staff of the Commercial Intelligence Department of the Division and Branch Societies. Clubs directly under the auspices of the C. M. A. have been organized in Toronto and Montreal, and an outline of organization, followed in all except one particular, was supplied to organizers of a club for Central Ontario with headquarters in London, which meets at Brantford, London, and Windsor. The latter two organizations are now being organized as the establishment of an active basis of the clubs in British Columbia and the Atlantic Provinces. The divisional secretaries are co-operating in getting the clubs established, realizing that they offer a further opportunity for service to members. The objects of the club have been to promote a better understanding of the factors which influence the development of our export trade and to stimulate the spirit of mutual assistance on the part of the members. The Canadian National Export Club has been the means by which the local clubs have been contacted with the Association. It has acted as a clearing house for information, supervised or prepared articles for industrial Canada, kept in touch with the C. M. A. departments on all subjects of mutual interest, and from time to time issued bulletins conveying to members information of a more intimate character than could be used in industrial Canada.

Authority was recently given by the Executive Council whereby the work of the Commercial Intelligence Committee has been separated for the sake of convenience, dispatch and adequacy of treatment, into Domestic and Export "divisions". The two divisions are charged with the same two main duties: to form the Commercial Intelligence Committees. The work formerly carried on by the Canadian National Export Club will be taken over by the Export Service of the Commercial Intelligence Committee. The local clubs have been contacted with the Association and to report to the Export Service of the Commercial Intelligence Committee.

It is anticipated that this specialization will enable the association to avail itself of the services of members especially interested in one or other of export or domestic work and so make for increasing efficiency and for the further development of the constructive side of both classes of work.

The Export Club of Toronto has held nine monthly meetings. Addresses have been given by experts in banking and marine insurance, manufacturers who have a first hand knowledge of certain foreign markets, trade commissioners, and members of the Club who have had experience in selling goods abroad. It has been the custom for those present to ask the speaker questions on any phase of the subject which they were especially interested in, and should have been derived from the exchange of information between members of the Club, both in the meetings and outside.

Some of the subjects dealt with have been:

Financial and Business Conditions in South America.

Markets for Canadian Products in Caribbean Countries.

The Development of an Export Market.

The Use of the Parcel Post in Export Trade.

Customs and Conditions in Marine Insurance Policies.

Trade Possibilities in Mexico.

The World Situation as it affects the Canadian Export Trade.

The Foreign Markets, Foreign Transportation and Executive Committees have met during the year and considered questions which have arisen from time to time. These include: "Marine Insurance Rates," "The Order of Shipment to Venezuela and Colombia," and "Instructions with reference to Australia. A number of members are interested in the development of Parcel Post service for foreign countries. The Foreign Transportation Committee has considered this question and found that in several respects Canadian exporters were handicapped by comparison with shippers from the United States and other countries. With the approval of the Club's memorandum has been prepared and forwarded to the Post Office Department.

The Export Club of Montreal and District was organized in November, 1931, and has held five meetings at one meeting the Directors of the Commercial Intelligence Service of the Department of Trade and Commerce advised the Club of the importance of export work and explained the services the Commercial Intelligence Service would give to members in arranging export trade. Hon. J. A. Robt, the Minister of Trade and Commerce, outlined the policy of the Department, and Mr. H. H. Watson spoke on foreign trade and foreign relations.

The Executive Committee of the Club has been very active, and the following members the type of questions would arise from the service to members. The committee has been very active in giving help to members in the form of information. From time to time the committee has brought up that the attention of other members to the C. M. A.

In submitting plans to the Council, emphasis was laid on the desirability of having the delegation assume the character of a semi-business mission rather than a purely business mission. It is felt that this longer view has been amply justified by the results. A host of West Indian business men and officials have been provided by the personal contact with some idea of the Canadian business viewpoint and methods and are more fully informed with regard to Canadian products generally. The personal relationships established by this interchange of views will aid greatly in maintaining and increasing Canadian West India trade. Already the Department is dealing with several important enquiries, some general and some specific, the solution of which will be of mutual benefit. The question of direct imports from the West Indies is one of the most vital and may entail the ordinary source of the importation, but since it remains a fact that greater imports of raw materials, etc., from the West Indies will ultimately result in greater exports of Canadian goods to the West Indies the slight diversion from the usual course will be justified. Full reports on the trip are being printed for the information of interested members. All the members of the party have rendered great service to the Association and to individual members doing or seeking to do business in the British West Indies, and the full reports obtained have been made possible through the courtesy, zeal and enthusiasm of Mr. C. J. Payne, Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, and Mr. Graham P. Towers, Royal Bank of Canada, Montreal, who accompanied the delegation.

WARD TO GO ON TRIAL JULY 17

White Plains, N.Y., June 20.—Waiter Ward, wealthy baker's son, probably will go on trial for the murder of Clarence Peters, ex-sailor, on July 17, it was learned from a reliable source late today.

This information, coming close on the heels of conferences held by Isaac N. Mills, former appellate division justice, and the newest access to reports that an agreement had been reached whereby District Attorney Weeks would ask an early trial provided George H. Ward, the baker's father, would return from his tour of the middle west and give deputy sheriffs a chance to serve on him a grand jury subpoena they have been carrying around for nearly two weeks. This report lacked confirmation, but it was pointed out that Mr. Weeks recently said he could not complete his case against Ward until he had heard Ward's son's testimony on the blackmail plot, which Waiter Ward claimed lay back of the shooting.

Justice McHugh, who recently denied a motion for an early trial of the case asserting he had no intention of holding over after June 30, when his term at White Plains ends, has consented, it was learned, to start the trial on July 17 provided District Attorney Weeks is ready to proceed.

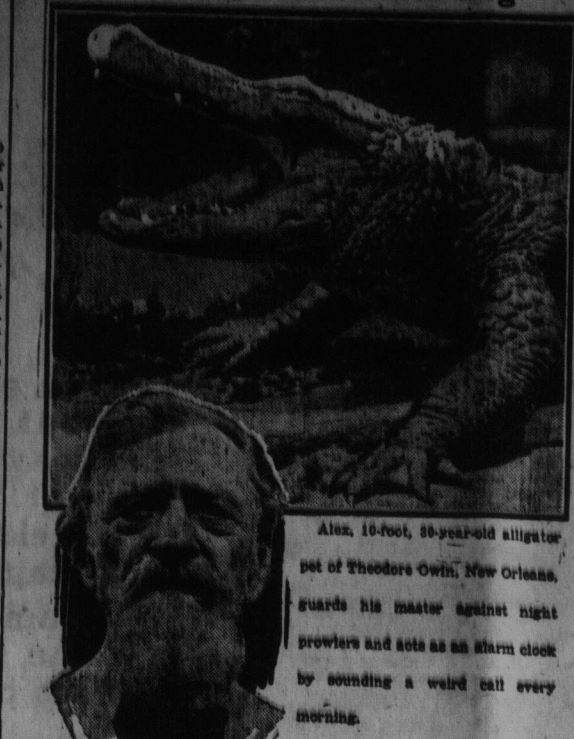
Unless Ward can get trial at a continuation of the present term, he will have to spend the summer in jail. There is no further term of court until fall, and the first degree offense with which he is charged, is a non-bailable one.

DEPUTATION WAITS ON LLOYD GEORGE

London, June 21.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Pension Lloyd George received one of the largest deputations yesterday at Number 10 Downing street which has ever attended at the Prime Minister's residence, comprising 120 persons, including some sixty members of the House of Commons, who appeared on behalf of the Board of Guardians which are in grave financial straits owing to the heavy calls for unemployment relief. The Premier, while expressing sympathy, said he could not ask the House of Commons to sanction an increase for the Board of Guardians for unemployment relief based on local taxation. The only remedy he could see for the present unfavorable conditions was a revival of trade.

SEEK NEW MARKETS FOR CANADIAN COAL

Deputy Minister of Mines Going to England in This Connection.

Ottawa, June 21.—Announcement of vigorous and sustained policy of encouragement for the mining industry in Canada was made tonight by the Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, and of Mines. A determined effort will be made to open up new markets for Canadian mineral products. Dr. C. C. Campbell, deputy minister of mines, is leaving at once for England and the continent in this connection. In view of the impending enactment of high tariff legislation in the United States, tending to restrict the market for Canadian minerals in that country, it is considered of great importance to the industry that new markets be developed.

Court Discusses Charge Against Sir H. Montagu Allan

Montreal, June 21.—Judge Cusson, in the Magistrate Court here today, dismissed the complaint against Sir H. Montagu Allan, which charged, on behalf of the Minister of Finance, that he had been guilty of negligently signing a false return to the Government of the affairs of the Merchants' Bank of Canada for the month of October, 1931. Sir Montagu was president of the Merchants' Bank up to the time of its amalgamation with the Bank of Montreal.

The inquiry, which came to an abrupt end after counsel for prosecution addressed the court, urging that there should be a commitment in the case in view of the fact that the Minister of Justice, the Attorney-General of the Province of Quebec, and the Grand Jury of the present term of the King's Bench had practically reversed the judgment which had been delivered in the almost similar case against D. C. Macdonald, former general manager of the same bank.

His Lordship did not concur with this view, and when counsel stated that he had decided to forego argument, Judge Cusson promptly dismissed the complaint.

The principal feature of the evidence heard today was the point established by H. Macdonald, who had been called in by Sir Montagu to report on the condition of the bank to the effect that Sir Montagu had had no chance to examine the October report, which is the subject of the charge.

London, July 21.—The Government was defeated in the House of Lords today when Lord Jaffington's motion condemning the Palestine mandate, was adopted by a vote of sixty to twenty-nine, although the Earl of Balfour, Acting Foreign Minister, made a strong speech defending the Government's policy and the mandate.

RAILS TO SUFFER LOSSES IN REVENUE

Total of 16,300,000 Decrease in Year's Income Because of Proposed Rate Reductions.

Ottawa, June 21.—(By Canadian Press).—The new proposals of the railways in regard to rate reductions, would mean, according to the evidence of their representatives, a loss in revenue of approximately \$16,300,000. These figures were given to the special House Committee on Railway Transportation Costs at the sitting yesterday.

The largest estimate of loss came from the C. P. R. and was for \$8,325,000, to which the biggest contribution was made by the new reduction on grain. The Canadian National estimate of loss is \$8,875,000. The losses estimated by the Grand Trunk aggregate \$1,085,000.

THOUSANDS OF SHOTS WERE EXCHANGED

Darkness Put End to Hostilities Between Union Miners and Strike Breakers.

Harris, Ill., June 21.—Darkness tonight compelled cessation of hostilities between union miners and employees of the Southern Illinois Coal Company's strip mine near here, after hours of fighting in which thousands of shots were exchanged. One union miner is known to have been killed, and several others are reported to have been injured. The mine was closed because of confusion at the camp.

TO FURTHER CONSIDER JOINT STRIKE ACTION

Leaders of the Striking Miners and Rail Unions Threaten Nation With Walk Out.

Cincinnati, June 21.—Further meetings to consider joint strike action were being planned today between leaders of the leading striking miner unions and rail unions, that are threatening a nation-wide walkout next month. The union chiefs indicated that they expected to hold conferences here this week, to be followed by a later meeting in Chicago, where the rail leaders will canvass the strike vote next week.

A unanimity of sentiment as to the necessity of the rail strike was shown by a joint statement of President John L. Lewis, of the miners, and J. M. Jewell, head of the rail unions, issued last night after the first formal discussion of the proposed joint strike action. The statement, which the union men said they regarded as important on account of its authority, declared a "common crisis" faced both the railroad men and the miners, and added "it is only natural that these things to protect their separate interests."

\$5,000 LIQUOR RAID IN BOSTON

Big Seizure Made in Building in Washington Street — One Arrest Made.

Boston, June 21.—After an all-night vigil in the driving rain, prohibition enforcement agents today raided the fifth floor of the building at 335 Washington street, North, and confiscated more than a truckload of real liquor, alcohol, booze, faked labels and forged government strip stamps, all valued at about \$5,000.

The place raided was occupied by the Blackstone Products Company and Luis Segal, the only person on the premises at the time of the raid, alleged to be the head of the company, was placed under arrest.

The government agents seized nearly 500 bottles of liquor, a number of a bottling plant, Prohibition stamps, and a large number of gallon cans of alcohol. The place was described as being a bottling plant. Prohibition Supervisor Roberts said that it was one of the most extensive located in this vicinity. The labels captured bore the names of former well-known brands of whiskeys, but it is alleged that these faked labels, together with the government strip stamps, were pasted over the cork to give the products a "bottled in bond" appearance.

The place was "spotted" yesterday when an agent in passing noticed two carrying out a case of what looked like real whiskey. He investigated and the all-night guard vigil resulted.
