At the Missionary Meeting, *Loosevers*, the Chairman, who is an Indian, in an excellent speech, urged the Indians to increased liberality, and hoped the day was not distant when they would undertake to support their own Missionary. His contribution was consistent with the principles he advocated, for he subscribed ten dollars.

During our four years' residence among them, we have had many pleasing and profitable seasons; we have had also occasions for sorrow, and humiliation.

As we take our leave of the New Credit Indians, we sincerely desire their prosperity, and hope to meet them in *Tahpening*.

Death has removed several of our old people, but their places have been filled. The Indians are assuming more industrial and sober habits. There has not been nearly so much consumption among them as there was last Spring. They do not make as rapid improvement as we could wish for, yet they are very much better than they were. Christianity has been to them a blessing of infinite value.
