daily average of 42,800 for the 55 of
fices or at a rate of 16,000,000 for a
year of 365 days. Much trouble is
due to careless wiiting, to the
use
of a pencil in writing the addressand failure to give the proper street
address. With the Christmas season at hand, bringing immense quantities of mail to be dealt with, it will
be necessary that the public adopt
more careful methods in the preparation of its mail matter, if the daily
average of misdirected mail is not
to amount to an overwhelming figure.
In this-connection the following
points to be observed are pointed
out:—Prepay postage fully; address
sent by parcel post, but do not seal
the parcels as sealed parcels are subfect to lefter rate of postage; mail
Christmas parcels early; insure valuable parcels.
