THE MINERS' CONVENTION.

President Mitchell Delivers His Annual Address.

Indianapolis, Jan. 21.—The first thing on the programme at the Miners' National Convention was the reading of President Mitchell's annual report. The 200 delegates present gave the reading close attention.

President Mitchell began his address President Mitchell began his address by impressing upon the delegates the interests committed to their care. Of the many important events affecting the interests and welfare of the toilers of the country, he said the anthracite coal strike stood pre-eminent. Vital principles were at stake, which, if defeated, would have given to the American labor movement a shock, from which it would have required years to recover.

After giving a brief history of the great strike, including the effort of civic federation to settle the controversy between the miners and the operators, the appointment of the strike commissin by President Roosevelt, of which Judge George Gray is the head, and the White House conference, Mr. Mitchell continued:—'It would of course be improper at this time for me to comment upon the investigation now being conducted by the Anthracite Coal Strike Commission, more than to say that its members are eminent men, in whose impartiality and judgment I have full confidence. Firm in my opinion of our ability to demonstrate the justice of our claims, I have no fear of the outcome. The fact that strikes are becoming less numerous is due to the operation of the joint agreements. Local and general strikes occur more often in districts where the operators refuse to recognize the organization or

in districts where the operators refuse to recognize the organization or treat with its accredited officers."

Referring to injunctions, Mr. Mitchell said:—"Government by injunction is one of the most insidious, harassing one of the most insidous, harassing and dangerous methods resorted to by the enemies of workmen to destroy labor organization and to circumvent the constitutional right of trial by jury. The whole system of government by injunction grows from the distrust of the ultion grows from the distrust of the ultra-capitalists for democratic institutions. The reasons given for the issuing of injunctions are always misleading and generally false. Government by injunction is not only hostile to organized labor, but it is hostile to constitutional liberty. If the American people do not check this arbitrary power it will result in the annihilation of labor unions, and then of all other forms of associations disliked by capitalists. Secretary Wilson's report in the matter of relief funds during the strike said that "the total amount donated by the different branches of our organization

The amount received from the special anthracite assessment was \$1,967,026, making a total of \$2,-225,370 from the members of the United Mine Workers. To this amount must be added \$119,956, donated by the trades unions and the public, making a grand total of \$2,645,324."
