## THE EIPPEL TOWER.

TIII: nosit conspicuous featuro of the Paris Exposition of '89 was the fanous Eiffel tower, upon this pago, the highest structuro in tho world. It is a beautiful lace.liko structure of iron and stael, resting on fuur grest legs and rising gracefully to the height of about 1000 feet. And a very queer sensation it was to wind one's way downward seemingly with little between one and tho horizon or the catth than the gauzy network of sleel of the tower:
The English, not to be outdone by tho French, aro erecting tower in London sbout one quarter higher than thls ingeclevators of which will run straight up from the ground to tho top in a much shorter time than those of the Eiffol Torer. The cut on the Inst page shows the onormous Torrergeth of the foundation, which, indeod, it needs to have to siuntain the strain of the winds and the pressure of the enomous weight of iron.
