WALLACE, NATHANIEL CLARKE. (*West York.*)

Third s. of Capt. Nathaniel Wallace, of Woodbridge, who came to Can. from Sligo, Irel. in 1834. B. in Woodbridge, Co. of York, 21 May, 1844. Ed. at the Public School there, and for a short time in 1863 at Weston Grammar School. M., 7 June, 1877, in the city of Ottawa, to Belinda, youngest dau. of the late James Gilmour, of Ottawa. Taught Public School from 1864 to 1869, when he went into business. Is now a merchant and flour miller. Was First Deputy Reeve of the Tp. of Vaughan from 1874 to 1879 and was Warden of the Co. of York in 1878. Has been for many years Co. Master of the Orangemen of West York, and was Grand Treasurer of the Orange Grand Lodge of Ont. West, from 1877 to 1883 when he resigned. Takes an active interest in Agricultural Societies. Is President of the York Farmers' Colonization Co. the operations of which are in the North-West. First returned to Parlt. at g. e. 1878 and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Woodbridge, Ont.*

WATSON, ROBERT. (*Marquette.*)

Father, the late George Watson, came to Can. from Edinburgh, Scot., in 1847 and settled in Elora, Ont. Mother, a native of Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Elora, 30 April, 1853, and ed. at the Common School, Salem, Co. of Wellington. M. 15 July, 1880, Isabel, dau. of Duncan Brown, Esq., of Lobo, Ont. Is a millwright by trade. Is now engaged in the grain trade, land breaking and railroad contracting. Went to Manitoba in 1876. Has been in the municipal council of Portage la Prairie for two years. First returned to Part. at last g. e. A Liberal and opposed to the policy of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Portage la Prairie, Manitoba.*

WELDON, CHARLES WESLEY, A.M., Q.C. (*St. John.*)

Eldest s. of Hon. John W. Weldon, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of N. B., by Frances Chandler (who died in 1844), youngest dau. of Hon. Judge Upham, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of N.B., at its first organization. Judge Upham was a Massachusetts Loyalist, and
