At the first SRC meeting of this term, on September 25, it was noted that the Reading Week, the period between the last day of regular classes and the beginning of final examinations, has this year been slashed from seven to five days. A motion was shortly passed calling for either a lengthening of the week to equal that of last year or for the incorporation of a Spring Break of three class days, both without the extension of the school year.

A quick check of other Atlantic Universities revealed that Mount Allison, at eight days, has the longest Reading Week, (Memorial of St. John's ranks a close second with six days), and that with a break of only four days, Dalhousie

University has the shortest. An even quicker check proved that Memorial is the only Atlantic University to be blessed with more than the usual Good Friday - Easter Sunday break for the Easter feasting — the Newfoundlanders return to class on the Tuesday following Easter.

SRC President Hunter told the Brunswickan that he has spent a letter containing Council's recommendations on this matter, to the Senate.

Alumni Assistance Pending

The Alumni may help to pay for the new student centre. Chairman of the Alumni Student Liason Committee, Arthur Doyle, made the announcement at the SRC meeting last week.

He was discussing ways in which the Alumni Association had helped the University. "We own a few bricks in almost every building on the campus," he said. "And we paid for half of this Student Centre. We might even help to pay for the new student centre," he said.

The Student Building Committee, organizing and planning the new building, is composed of students from UNB, St. Thomas University, and New Brunswick Teachers College. The students from these institutions had expected to pay half of the cost of the building, with the other half coming from the three administrations.

One Grand Project

The Students Representative Council Centennial Committee wants more suggestions. Rob Asprey, chairman of the committee said there have been about 10 submissions so far, but more would be appreciated.

Asprey said he has had discussions with the administration on the subject of a student centennial project. He added that he was disappointed that the students were not asked about their ideas for a centennial project before the University went ahead with its plans to rehabilitate a one-room school near the O'Brien Gates.

Earlier, the Administration had indicated that it had no plans for a project. About two weeks ago the University announced that it had been given a \$4000 grant for the school-house project.

Council has allotted \$1000 for its project, and hopes for aid from the Alumni and from the Administration.

Asprey's Centennial Committee is meeting this week.

There is no deadline for suggestions, but Asprey said they should be made soon.
