

Malton Community Council:

"Prevention is cheaper than jail"

 "We see prevention as being a lot cheaper than putting kids in jail," said Pierrette Skrba, manager of a team hired to work with youths in the Malton area.

The team of five was hired by the Malton Community Council under a Canada Works grant that will pay their salaries until the end of April 78.

Two of the staff, including Ms. Skrba, hold degrees in social work.

VANDALISM IN MALTON

Recently Malton has been the scene of increasing vandalism especially in the area of its new community centre. Opened only a few months ago the girls' washroom in the centre has had to be painted four times to cover graffiti and it needs to be painted again.

The program has been divided into four separate areas of work in an attempt to solve the community's vandalism problems.

Two of the workers, Graham Samuels and Neville Myton, will work as a team to set up social and sport activities in the area for teens in the 13 to 20 age range.

The two have no intention of dictating the activities of the kids and are currently contacting youth organizations to see what the teens themselves want set up.

Samuels says the kids have nothing to keep them occupied at the present time and this problem leads to vandalism.

GOAL: BRING ETHNIC GROUPS TOGETHER
 Their short-range goal is to set up the programs with the long range goal of getting all ethnic groups to come together and work together," Samuels said.

Myton described their goal as helping the teens become "one big international family." Volunteers on the community council pointed out that the teens tend to segregate into separate groups.

Rafiq Admad was hired to work with the East Indian immigrants in Malton as well as in the rest of Mississauga.

His job is to provide information to students and teachers on the cultural background of the East Indians as well as to help them adjust to Canadian society.

CULTURAL SHOCK

"This group faces the biggest cultural shock" of all ethnic cultures immigrating to Canada. Brought up under caste systems, they are suddenly in a society that stresses competitiveness, he said.

"They are withdrawn and we are looking for incentives to get them out into the community," Admad explained. He will be available to all Mississauga schools to explain the differences in the two cultures.

Valma Cortellucci will be in charge of the multi-cultural program. She said she hopes to integrate all of the ethnic groups into the com-

munity putting special emphasis on seeing what programs parents find acceptable for their children so that they won't be hesitant about letting their kids attend any social functions that might be set up.

POLICE WALKING A BEAT

Already she says she has found there aren't enough community service officers. The police should be doing more preventative work, she said. She said she plans to speak to Police Chief Douglas Burrows about getting more officers out on foot in Malton. If they are on foot they can get to know kids and prevent vandalism, she said.

Samuels told the council that through his experience with youths he had found that often the kids found it easier to "hang around plazas, drink beer and smoke dope than to get involved."

Volunteer Carol Berry said currently workers are dealing with children who have grown up by television sets. "They've grown up watching rather than participating."

She said her point was illustrated at community teen dances where the "Canadian kids" just stood around and watched while the new immigrant teens participated in the activities. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the lands described as follows:
 All right, title and interest in the following lands:

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act provides that:
 (a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer:
 (i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and
 (ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows:
 "owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;
 "registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper Land Registry or Sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
