BUT ONE WAY TO VOTE FOR TEMPERANCE PEOPLE

HON. W. L. M. KING SPEAKS OF GREAT MORAL ISSUE IN CEN-TRE SIMCOE.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Barrie, June 18.—Hon. W. L. Mackensie King addressed a large meeting here to-night in the Opera House in favor of Mr. H. E. Jory, the Liberal candidate in Centre Simcoe. Mr. King dweit largely on the abolish-the-bar policy, declaring it to be a great moral issue, which the people must carefully judge and vots as their consciences dictated. In this event, he said, there was but one way to vote, and that was for Mr. Rowell and his policy. Mr. King's address on the temperance issue was very much to the point, and showed distinctly where people advocating temperance could take no other way in this election but to follow Mr. Rowell. The speaker also referred to the extravagance of the Government, the weaknesses in the Agriculture and Education Departments, and faulty administration in the development of New Ontario.

Mr. E. C. Drury, the well-known Grange man, and Mr. Jory also made fighting addresses. Prospects are bright in Simcoe, and the Liberals and temperance people are fighting with a determination, that
