PRESIDENT WILSON'S ADDRESSES ON THE NEW FREEDOM

A reasoned statement on the basis and exercise of Freedom in its modern sense, as understood by many of the leading men of modern America. Dr. Wilson tries to show how the old order has changed and how the old formulas must be interpreted to suit present-day conditions without any sacrifice of their intrinsic value. As the work of a man who has had the greatest of opportunities of putting his theories to practical test, this volume must be of absorbing interest to all thinking people. The book is composed of the most suggestive portions of certain speeches made by Dr. Wilson at various places in his own country, but it is not merely a book of campaign speeches. It is a record of discussions on a number of very vital subjects in the free form of extempore spoken words. The latter portion deals with the need of "preparedness" in the United States. The purpose of the volume is to make Dr. Wilson better known to the English people and to prove that British and American freedom are essentially similar.

THE WAR LORDS. By A. G. GARDINER.

This is an entirely new book by Mr. A. G. Gardiner, whose Prophets, Priests, and Kings has given pleasure to many thousands of readers. In that book the author's object was the elucidation of character; but in this new volume—The War Lords—the author treats of the origins, issues and conduct of the War in the light of the personalities of the principal actors, and their influence upon the world tragedy of to-day, Amongst others there are chapters upon King Albert, the Kaiser, Lord Fisher, Sir John Jellicoe, Sir John French, General Joffre, General von Hindenburg, M. Venizelos, etc. The book contains 15 portraits and drawings by Clive Gardiner.

UNDER THE GERMAN BAN IN ALSACE AND LORRAINE. By Miss Betham-Edwards.

The book is the record of Miss Betham-Edwards' impressions and her experiences of German rule gathered in the course of her travels in the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine. She describes very vividly the almost pathetic longing of the people to be under French rule owing to their detestation of German tyranny. A very topical book.
