VALUE FOR YOUR MONEY.

The man who buys a daily paper for a cent, if he would stop to consider, would be quickly convinced that he has got more than his money's worth; that the cost of the collection and publication of the news and the materials involved therein is vastly in excess of the money he has paid for the paper, even though the circulation be a very large one. This was true a few years ago, and the cost of publishing an up-to-date paper has steadily advanced almost monthly. The San Francisco papers have been obliged in self-defence to agree upon an advance in the price of their several publications. The San Francisco Bulletin in announcing the change of price makes a statement of the actual increase of cost in its own office as compared with 1896: Composition, 58 per cent.; pressroom, 213 per cent.; etching, 285 per cent.; mailing, 147 per cent., a total in the fixed charges of the mechanical department of 219 per cent., to say nothing of the great increase in the paper material. A mimilar advance is notable in the telegraphic and other departments. There is not a first class daily published upon this continent that has not met a similar increase in the cost of production, while it has generally supplied the paper at the former rate to subscribers.-Ottawa Citi-

AN OUTSIDE OPINION.

The Montreal Gazette, whose editorial page has long been noted for its strength and moderation, says: "The organs of the Ross Government are now holding up their hands in holy horror at the criticism directed at the report of the Gamey commission.

"There has been no attack made upon the judiciary which was not invited. The facts in the case are that the Ross Government saw fit to disregard the right of the legislature to maintain its own honor and refer the charges made by Mr. Gamey to a commission chosen by itself, the accused party. The legislature did not choose that commission. The power to seek its appointment was obtained only through the deciding votes of the men against whom the charges were leveled. The commissioners were chosen by the men against whom the charges were laid. The opposition was a solid unit against the reference of the charges to a commission. It was given no voice in the naming of its members. It was compelled to take its case before a court to which it had expressed its strongest objections. That commission heard the evidence. No man who is not a bigoted partisan will pretend for one moment that that evidence declared conclusively for the guilt or the innocence of the accused parties.

"The report presented by the commissioners, however, not only held that the complete innocence of the accused had been established, but that the accuser was really the guilty party. In order to reach this finding the commissioners were compelled to ignore evidence entitled to the gravest consideration, and to extend full acceptance to that of other witnesses whose stories had been contradicted. To allege that that report was marked by bias is to mercly point out an uncontradictable fact."
